IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, April 3.—The Senate, at 3:10 p. m., after two hours spent in secret legislative session, opened its doors. During the secret session Mr. Riddleberger's resolution to consider the fisheries treaty in open session was the only subject of debate, but several Senators ventured to discuss briefly the merits of the treaty itself; being, however, called to order for so doing. Messrs. Edmunds and Hoar made a strong fight against the resolution.

Upon motion of Mr. Butler the resolution was ordered to be referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations; only eight Senators voting in the negative.

After the public session was resumed, the Bond Purchase bill was taken up, and a vote was taken on Mr. Palmer's motion to recommit the bill. The motion was rejected.

Mr. Spooner offered as a substitute for the whole bill the following: That Section 2 of the act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1882, in these words, "that the Secretary of the Treasury may at any time apply the surplus money in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated (or so much thereof as he may consider proper) for the purchase or redemption of United States bonds; provided, that bonds so purchased shall constitute no part of the sinking fund, but shall be cancelled," was intended to be a permanent provision of the law; and the same is hereby declared to have been since its enactment and to be now, in full force and effect.

Agreed to without division.

Mr. Beck then offered an amendment as an additional section, which after being modified as suggested by Messrs. Stewart and Allison, provides that when the circulation of any portion thereof of any national bank, not in liquidation, shall be surrendered by the deposit of United States notes in the Treasury or otherwise, and the same or any equivalent amount shall be taken by other National Banks within thirty days, the Secretary of the Treasury shall purchase at the market price an equivalent amount of silver bullion, in excess of the minimum monthly silver coinage, which shall be coined and used as provided for in the silver coinage bill of the 28th of February, 1878, provided that nothing in the act shall alter or repeal the silver coinage act of 1878.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
The House then went into Committee of the Whole for consideration of the special order.

Pending debate the committee rose, and the House took a recess, the evening session to be for the consideration of bills reported by the Committee on Military Affairs.

At the evening session the following bills were passed: Appropriating \$300,000 for the construction of an arsenal at Columbia, Tenn., and for the promotion of officers of the army after twenty years continuous service in one grade.

After an eloquent speech by Mr. Hooker, a bill introduced by Mr. Crain, of Texas, was passed for the retirement of Gen Alfred Pleasanton, with the rank of Colonel.

STATE NEWS.
Raleigh Visitor: Mr. Lee A. Denson, son of Capt. C. B. Denson, of this city, who has been studying with a view to entering the United States Signal Service, has received an appointment and has been ordered to duty in the Signal Bureau of the War Department in Washington City, and will leave on Thursday next for that city to enter upon his duties.

Raleigh News and Observer: The efforts of Rev. J. L. White, late pastor of the First Baptist Church of this city, who is now assisting Rev. W. R. Gwaltney, pastor of the Baptist Church of Greensboro, in a series of revival meetings, are being attended with very great success. He has been assisting in the meetings for two weeks past and during that time there have been upwards of sixty professions of religion.

CROSS AND WHITE.
The Former Makes a Confession.
(Raleigh News and Observer Specials.)
TORONTO, Ont., April 3.—The Raleigh bank case is assuming a peculiar form. It is developing into a triangular fight of considerable magnitude and special interest. The police authorities here have the prisoners. The Raleigh authorities intend to bid high for them and the Norfolk National Bank has a claim on a portion of the boodle found on the prisoners that they purpose putting into practicable shape unless their claim is speedily satisfied. Mr. Caldwell Hardy, cashier of the Norfolk National Bank, arrived in the city to-day to look after the interests of his institution. It appears that White, the day before he and Cross fled from Raleigh, telegraphed to the Norfolk National Bank for an advance of \$10,000 on a consignment of cotton and tobacco to New York, promising to send in return a bill of exchange on New York the next day. The banks had been accustomed to obliging each other in this way, so the request was not unusual. The amount wanted was duly forwarded and received by White, who pocketed the package and, with Cross, fled. He also squeezed two other banks under similar pretenses, a Richmond, Va., National Bank for \$10,000 and a Raleigh bank for \$5,000. This was all the money they took away with them. The Norfolk cashier proposes to secure his \$10,000, and will, if necessary, prefer an information against the pair of boodlers, charging them with bringing stolen money into Canada, to which it is probable they will plead guilty, they having, it is reported, admitted their culpability.

Mr. Hardy says he spent two whole days in a vain effort to straighten out the tangle in the books of the Raleigh bank, but had to give up the task in despair. He thinks it probable that one of the prisoners, at least, will be given safe conduct across the line in order that he may put the books and affairs of the wrecked bank into proper shape.

TORONTO, ONT., April 3.—C. D. Heatt, Chief of Police of Raleigh, arrived in the city this evening, having been detained several hours by a railway accident on the New York Central R. R. He is accompanied by F. H. Busbee, District Attorney, Mr. Graves, one of the prisoners' victims, and Jas. A. Rogers, ex-deputy sheriff. After leaving Raleigh on Friday they went direct to Washington where they secured the necessary requisition papers for the extradition of White and Cross on the charge of forgery. They left Washington at 10 o'clock on Saturday night and traveled continuously until this evening. Mr. Heatt says he hopes to return with the boodlers at once but in this expectation he is likely to be disappointed, as their counsel has resolved to fight extradition to the bitter end. He says he will assist Mr. Hardy in his scheme rather than let them go back. Yesterday Cross sent from jail for Detective Cuddy, and when that officer went down he found Cross crying bitterly. Cross said he wished to make a clean breast of the whole affair and made the following confession:

"I am very sorry for what has happened. If anything should happen to me I want to leave everything all right about White, so you go to Raleigh and give evidence that will clear White. I want to tell you here in the presence of White that he had nothing to do with the forgeries. I did them all. If anything should happen to my wife they will never try me. The bank was in an awful bad state when we took hold of it, and under our management it continued to fail. We saw we should have to go to jail, so we decided to try the next best thing. We resolved to get as much money as we could secure and skip. We did that and it has turned out for the worse."

Referring to the forgeries Cross said \$15,000 would cover the whole amount.

Yesterday being a legal holiday no session of the court was held. Therefore the prisoners will come before the county judge to-day. The pair are completely broken down and take their sad plight very much to heart. Cross expresses great contrition and feels deeply his condition. He is filled with fear concerning his wife, who, it appears, is ill. County Crown Attorney Budger, who will have charge of the extradition proceedings for the crown, had a long interview with the parties from Raleigh to-night, posting himself on matters.

News and Observer editorial: There is no knowing the extent of the forgeries committed in the broken State National Bank. They probably began with the forging of Cross' father's name to notes for stock, on the strength of which the former was made president, and they have been steadily multiplied and increased in amount ever since. Finally both the wreckers became desperate and not only pocketed all the funds of the bank they could lay hold of in any way and could borrow on the strength of the bank's name, but forged even the names of dead men and filed them as representing loans. It will be some time yet before the full extent of this forgery can be ascertained.
