IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, April 9.—Among the petitions and memorials presented and referred was one of the publishers and others of New York, for the passage of the House bill for the issue of fractional paper currency, 10, 15 and 25 cents, and several in favor of an international copyright law from Typographical Unions in various States.

Mr. George, from the committee, reported back adversely the bill to extend the time for claims for French spoils. Placed on the calendar. A bill was introduced by Mr. Chandler, for the completion of the direct tax of 1861. This bill revives and reenacts sections of the act of 1861, imposing a direct tax of twenty millions, and provides for the collection of all unpaid balances with 5 per cent. interest thereon, the State to have the privilege of assuming their quota less one per cent. deduction, otherwise the tax is to be collected from the land of individuals, as provided in the original act.

The unfinished business was taken up, being the bill to provide for the admission of the State of Dakota into the Union and for the organization of the territory of Lincoln a substitute reported from the Committee on Territories to the original bill. It establishes the boundaries of the proposed State and designates the remaining portions of the present territory as the territory of North Dakota (not Lincoln) with Bismarck as the capital.

The bill went over till tomorrow. A message from the President relative to the purchase of lands in Florida on which to locate the Seminole Indians, was presented and referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs, and after the executive session the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
About 6 o'clock Mr. Oates asked unanimous consent to have a resolution read for information; but he was promptly met with objections from the Republican side. The following is the text of the resolution: Whereas, It is alleged by persons of veracity that there are large numbers of attorneys, lobbyists, claim agents and State agents, who are covertly using every means in their power to secure the passage of Senate bill 139, which is now under consideration in this House; and whereas, it is alleged that millions of money which would be appropriated by this bill, if it should be a law, will, under existing contracts, pass into the hands of said attorneys, lobbyists, claim agents, and State agents; therefore,

Resolved That a committee to consist of seven members of the House be appointed by the Speaker, gate said alleged, and to investigate and report thereon, and ascertain thirty days to the House within which they may exist between any attorney, lobbyist, claim agent or State agent and beneficiaries under the aforesaid bill, and that such committee have power to send for persons and papers and administer oaths; and that further consideration of the bill with its existing status be postponed until such committee report.

Subsequently Mr. Wheeler asked consent to offer a resolution for the appointment of a committee to ascertain what amount of the sum proposed to be paid out will inure to the benefit of the people and how much is to be paid to claim agents. Objection was made.

At 7:30 the Sergeant-at-arms appeared and reported that of 25 members absent without leave 20 were out of the city and the other five could not be found. He was directed to continue his search.

At 10:15, while dilatory motions were piled up one on another in great variety, Mr. E. B. Taylor asked unanimous consent, in the interest of good nature and good health, that the House take a recess until 11:45 to-morrow.

The speaker pro tem, put the request, and, after a short pause, declared it granted.

STATE NEWS.

He did not know the value of the precious metal and thought that they were comparatively worthless.

Raleigh Visitor: The case of the State vs Hearn for libel was given to the jury at 9:15 o'clock on Saturday night last, and at 9:40 a verdict of "not guilty" was rendered. It was adjudged by the Court that the prosecutor, Mr. J. L. Stone, be taxed with the cost of the suit. A nol prosequi was entered in the case against J. P. Caston. Thus has ended one of the most important suits of the kind that has ever taken place in North Carolina. There are yet two more cases to be tried at the next civil term of Wake Superior Court. The first case is a suit for damages against Mr. Hearn and the second a suit for damages against Mr. Gillespie, editor of the Statesville Mail, for copying the libellous articles.
