IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Mr. Chase presented petitions signed by 257 physicians, 866 pastors of churches, and 554 superintendents, officers and teachers of public schools of the District of Columbia, asking legislation to prohibit the sale of cigars and cigarettes, or tobacco, to boys under 16 years of age.

The petitions were ordered to be printed as a public document.

The Senate joint resolution, providing that public lands in Mississippi, Alabama and Arkansas, now subject to private entry, shall be disposed of according to the provisions of the homestead laws only until the pending legislation affecting such lands shall be disposed of, or until the present session of Congress adjourns, was reported from the committee and passed.

A bill to forfeit certain lands granted to railroads was taken up, discussed for a time and laid aside without action, and the "Annual Industry" bill was taken up.

Mr. Palmer, who is in charge of it, offered a substitute for it, which had been got up, he said, in conjunction with a distinguished member of the Judiciary Committee. The substitute having been read was ordered printed, and the bill was laid aside till to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Call the Senate bill to change the limit of the appropriation for a public building at Key West to \$175,000 and appropriating an additional sum of \$67,000, was taken from the calendar and passed.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The pending business coming over from Friday night's session, was the Senate bill granting a pension of one hundred dollars per month to the widow of Gen. James B. Ricketts, with an amendment reducing the rate to seventy-five dollars.

The amendment was adopted, and the bill as amended passed.

Under the call of States resolutions were introduced and referred directing the Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries to make sweeping investigation of the Alaska fur seal fisheries, and calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury for information upon the subject of these fisheries.

By Mr. Simmons, of North Carolina, for the appointment of a commission to inquire into the intellectual and industrial progress of the colored race since 1865.

This being the day devoted to the consideration of bills relating to the District of Columbia, Mr. Hemphill, of South Carolina, moved that the House go into Committee of the Whole upon the River and Harbor bill.

Mr. Foran, of Ohio, offered an amendment increasing from \$15,000 to \$150,000 the appropriation for a harbor at Cleveland, Ohio.

Pending discussion upon the amendment the committee rose, and the House adjourned.
