Christian Temperance Union propose to erect a building at Chicago, which will be the headquarters of the organization for the United States. It will cost about \$800,000.

Of the sixty-six savings banks in New Hampshire, it is reported that twenty-two of them paid last year 5 per cent., the highest ordinary dividend allowed by law; six paid 41. thirty-five paid 4, one paid 31, one paid 3, and one paid 2.

The high-license law appears to be thinning out the saloons in Phila delphia. Up to the present time in twelve wards, which in 1887 had 2.147 saloons, the number has been reduced to 551. At this rate the total number granted in the city will not exceed 1,500, as against some 6,000 in 1887. There is complaint, however, that many of the most objectionable saloons survive among the "fittest."

Mr. John W. Mackay seems to think that working to improve one's condition is in most instances better than the idleness of a strike. Says Mr. Mackay: "I rolled rocks in the Yuba river fourteen hours a day for months at a time and went to camp every night soaked to the bone, and did not average two dollars a day; but no one ever found me quite broke or ever heard me complain.'
