The woman suffrage question has come to a vote again in the Massachusetts Legislature, as in every Legislature with but two exceptions since 1867. The measure was presented only in the restricted form of a proposition to grant women the right to vote in municipal elections, but it secured only 36 affirmative votes to 107 in the negative. This is the smallest affirmative vote ever cast, and is in sharp contrast with the attitude of the legislators fifteen or twenty years ago, when in 1871 a amendment to strike out the word male and give women full suffrage received half the votes in the House of Representatives, and was defeat ed only by the casting yote of the Speaker. The trouble in Massachusetts, as everywhere else, appears to be the lack of support for the proposed change among the people in whose behalf it is urged.

It is estimated that the railroad mileage of Mexico owned by Americans is nearly 3,000 miles, and that the capital thus invested is upwards of \$80,000,000. The judges of election overruled the challenge, but the plaintiff has carried the case to the Supreme Court of the State, and it comes on in the May term. The Christian Advocate says that, as there are more than 25,000 Methodist ministers in the United States, it will be a decidedly interesting thing "for it to be declared that they cannot be citizens.
