IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Mr. Edmunds, from the Judiciary Committee, reported back adversely the Senate bill to repeal the statute allowing pensions to judges in certain cases. Placed on the calendar.

Mr. Edmunds also introduced a bill to increase the pensions of soldiers who contracted heart disease in the service. Referred.

The Senate then, on motion of Mr. Sherman, proceeded to executive business, and this being the first secret session for several days there was an accumulation of nominations by the President, among them that of Mr. Fuller, to be Chief Justice, all of which were referred to committees.

The doors were reopened fifteen minutes later, when the Senate resumed consideration of the Railroad Land Grant Forfeiture bill, the question being on the amendment by Mr. Call last Monday. This was amended so as simply to provide that all actual settlers of any lands in Florida, effected by railroad grants, who made actual settlement after the time limited in the granting act, and before May 1st, 1888, shall have the right to perfect their entries respectively under the homestead or preemption laws.

After some discussion the amendment as amended was agreed to. The bill was further discussed until 3 o'clock, when it went over till tomorrow, with the understanding that a final vote on the bill would be had to-morrow.

The Senate proceeded to the passage of individual pension bills on the calendar. The whole number of bills passed in sixteen minutes was 105; forty-two of them being House bills. Several of them for volunteer nurses at the rate of \$25 a month, and one for the widow of Gen. Chas. P. Stone (House bill) at \$50.

Mr. Culom, from the committee on Inter-State Commerce, reported a bill to amend the Inter-State Commerce law. Placed on the calendar.

The House bill for a public building at Asheville, N. C., was passed. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Farmer, of Penn., presented a memorial of dealers in tobacco of Philadelphia, in favor of a speedy repeal of the entire tax on tobacco. Referred, on motion of Mr. Phelan, of Tenn.

The Senate bill was passed for the establishment of a lighthouse at Newport News, Middle Ground, Va. The House then went into Committee of the Whole (Mr. Springer, Illinois, in the chair), on the Tar-

STATE NEWS.

Newbern Journal: The general conference of the A. M. E. Z. Church assemblies this morning at St. Peter's Church. This is the largest and most influential body of colored ministers that meets in this country. They represent the A. M. E. Z. Church throughout this country, Canada, the West Indies, and missions in Africa. Their Bishops and other distinguished ministers are largely in attendance.

Whitehall Record: There is a man in this county who is a second cousin to Ex-President Jeff Davis. That man is the Rev. D. B. Dow, a minister of the Baptist church. Rev. Mr. Dow's mother was a daughter of Jeff Davis' father's brother, which makes Mr. Dow's mother a first cousin to Mr. Davis and Mr. Dow a second cousin. Mr. Dow lives near Cerro Gordo in the county. He moved to the county about twelve years ago. He is a native of Columbia, S. C.

Wadesboro Messenger: On Tuesday, the 24th ult., about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, a fire occurred on Mr. C. M. Burns' place, situated six miles from Wadesboro and two miles from White's Store, which destroyed one of the best country residences in the county. The place was occupied by Mr. J. M. Henry. The family was at home and succeeded in saving all the furniture, so that Mr. Burns lost little or nothing. Mr. Burns lost by the burning about \$2,000. No insurance.

Asheville Citizens: Thirty-four thousand dollars of the city taxes have been collected by tax collector Reynolds up to date. — We yesterday saw several fine specimens of magnetic iron ore found in Run combe. — By the merest possible accident, Charles Radolph, of Philadelphia, the heir to \$39,000, was found in Asheville, in front of the Grand Central hotel, last Thursday, by a gentleman who, in carrying out the dying wish of a friend, has spent five years in fruitless search for a wayward young man.

Charlotte Chronicle: A religious revival has been in progress at Mountain Island, under the management of Rev. Z. Parish, formerly rector of the Church Street Methodist Church in this city. The meeting has closed and the result is the reclamation of 40 backsliders, and 28 conversions. — A German named Henry was yesterday engaged in jacking up a box can in the fruit yards of the Richmond & Danville Company in this city, when the jaws of the jack slipped, and the handle, a long wooden lever, flew up after the fashion of a catapult and hurled Henry some distance. The end of the lever struck Henry under the jaw, and when his comrades picked him up they were so sure that he was dead that they laid him out in one of the rooms at the depot. Notice of his death was being fixed up to be sent by telegraph to headquarters when the supposed corpse suddenly came to life and walked out of the room. Henry had been rendered insensible by the blow, but strange to say none of his bones were broken.

Raleigh News and Observer: On yesterday morning the community was shocked and horrified at the news of a terrible accident which had befallen Mr. J. R. Wrenn, an aged and highly respected citizen of this city, and the father of Messrs. Joe and Louis Wrenn, the popular and clever conductors on the R. & A. Railroad. Mr. Wrenn was on the inside of a freight car which was standing in the warehouse at the R. & G. depot, repairing the lock of the car door, when the shifting engine coupled on to the car and started with it. Mr. Wrenn attempted to step from the car door to the warehouse, but not stepping quickly enough, he was caught between the side of the car and the wall of the warehouse between which there was a space of about eight or ten inches, and thus wedged in this narrow space was rolled a distance of twenty five feet, when he dropped by the side of the track, with one leg under the car, which ran over the leg about one inch above the ankle, crushing it terribly. Doctors Hines, E. B. Haywood and Hubert Haywood were at once summoned, and the wounded man was removed to his home. He complained of great pain in his chest, and the doctors fear that there is some internal injury. It is uncertain yet as to whether the amputation of the foot will be necessary or not. Considering the narrow space between the side of the car and the wall of the warehouse was carried, wedged in between them, his escape from instant death is almost miraculous. At a late hour last night the doctors were hopeful of saving the foot and thought that if there were no internal injuries he would shortly recover.
