IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, May 3.—Mr. Stewart introduced a bill to execute certain treaty stipulations prohibiting Chinese immigration. Referred to the committee on Foreign Relations.
The bill for the establishment of a Bureau of Animal Industry was taken up. Mr. Palmer addressed the Senate in support of the bill and Mr. Vest opposed it. He proceeded to speak of what he called the "cattle syndicate," and said that people were helpless and writhing under it. It was the most terrible tyranny. There were five men or firms, in Chicago, which regulated the price of cattle every day. They met and fixed the price for the next day. So that these men owned the cattle raisers' property and confiscated it as absolutely as if they possessed the right to take it from his farm without paying him one cent.

The bill then went over and the Senate went into secret session. When the doors were reopened a bill was passed to perfect the quarantine service of the United States. It imposes a punishment of fine of not more than \$300, or imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both, upon any person, master, pilot or owner of a vessel entering any United States port in violation of the quarantine regulations framed under the act to prevent the introduction of infectious or contagious diseases into the United States. It provides for the establishment of additional quarantine stations at the mouth of the Delaware Bay, the entrance of Chesapeake Bay near Cape Charles, on the Georgia coast, at or near Key West, and at several Pacific coast points. Appropriations are made as follows: For the construction and maintenance of quarantine stations—at Delaware Breakwater, \$75,000; Cape Charles, Va., \$112,000; South Atlantic Station, (Sapelo Sound), \$38,500; Key West, \$38,000; Gulf Quarantine, (formerly Ship Island), \$15,000.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Mr. Belmont, of New York, presented and the House adopted the conference report on the joint resolution, accepting, on behalf of the United States, the invitation of the French Republic to take part in the International Exhibition to be held in Paris in 1889. (The Commissioner representing the United States will receive a salary of \$10,000.)
The House then went into Committee of the Whole (Mr. Springer, of Illinois, in the chair), on the Tariff bill.

Mr. Wilson, of West Virginia, a member of the Ways and Means Committee, said that the opponents of the bill represented the issue to be between free trade and protection, and addressed the House in favor of the bill.
The committee rose, and Mr. Stockdale, of Mississippi, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported, and the House passed with amendment, the Senate joint resolution providing that certain public lands in Mississippi, Alabama and Arkansas shall be sold as offered lands.

STATE NEWS.
Fayetteville Journal: Rev. Dr. Huske, who has for the past 37 years been the Rector of the St. John's Episcopal Church in this town, owing to feeble health, resigned the Rectorship of the church a year ago. The congregation was so reluctant to sever the life long relationship with their venerable Pastor, that they refused to accept his resignation, but instead, tendered him a year's absolute freedom from the cares and labors of the office, hoping that rest would restore him to his wonted vigor. After a year's respite, Dr. Huske again submitted his resignation to the Vestry last week saying that his health was still so imperfect that efficient discharge of the duties of his office as Rector was altogether beyond his strength and that he felt compelled to retire from the Rectorship. Under these circumstances

the Vestry accepted his resignation, but at once elected him Rector emeritus with a liberal salary. Thus has been brought to a close a long and honorable pastorate. His predecessor was Rector 20 years. This church then has had two Rectors in 57 years! Dr. Huske has the love and confidence not only of his people, but of the entire community.
Wilson Advance: Last Monday morning as Mr. and Mrs. Hayward Ward were walking along the street near the factory one of them stepped on what from the result must have been a dynamite bomb. Both were burnt and bruised considerably and badly frightened.

Asheville Citizen: Rev. Father White, of St. Laurence's Catholic Church, has resolved to purchase or build an infirmary for the special benefit of ailing or indigent people, whether residents or visitors. No place can be better suited for the afflicted than Asheville. The infirmary will be in charge of the Sisters of Mercy, but any one will be admitted who is in any way afflicted or suffering without regard to their religious beliefs.

Chatham Record: Mr. James E. Teague, of Matthews township, was stricken with paralysis some days ago. He was stricken while plowing in the field, and when found by the family was unconscious. He is one of Chatham's most respected citizens. On last Tuesday a remarkably fine herd of cattle passed through our town, being driven to Raleigh by Mr. W. B. Teague, of this county. They were the largest and fattest beaver ever seen here, and one of them was said to weigh 1,800 pounds.

Greenville Reflector: Reports of damage by the frost last week are coming in. Corn was more or less damaged, some sections sustaining more than others. Some few farmers had to plow up part of their crop and plant again. The greatest damage seems to have been done to the vineyards. The vines were blooming and all the new growth was killed. It is thought the grape crop will be almost a failure. Apples and peaches are not believed to be hurt much.

Charlotte Chronicle: Rev. G. L. Cook, whose supply of Paw Creek church terminated last Sunday, was in the city yesterday and left this morning on the North bound train for his old home near Staunton, Virginia. — A citizen of Catawba county tells us that rain is badly needed there, as well as elsewhere. The crops look well, except spring oats. Wheat never looked better at this season of the year and the prospects for a good fruit crop are fine.
