It is hard to say anything about politics. If we take up the theme, it is with a sense of duty and not because we care much about it. We are probably to have a new Chief Justice who writes poetry—perhaps the most interesting fact of the hour. Mr. Cleveland may enter upon the writing of his second letter of acceptance when he has the time, as it will soon be needed.
