Absinthe is the deadliest intoxicant in the world and its use is increasing. The drink was introduced into New York by Frenchmen and travellers and it is now a common beverage in hotels, clubs and fashionable bar rooms. French soldiers introduced it into Paris after the campaign in Algiers in 1844. In an astonishingly short period it permeated the civilized world. To-day its manufacture is one of the largest liquor trades of Europe. Neufchatel, in Switzerland, is the headquarters for its manufacture. Two millions of gallons yearly are made there. What France makes and does not consume is sent for the most part to America.

The associa: tion at that time instructed its board of directors "to communicate with the local Bar associations throughout the country and also with the American Bar Association, with the yiew of forming a national legal body, to be composed of delegates from the various associations, and to meet in annual convention, such body to have for its object the advancement of the science of law in this country. In December last the board of directors had received so many favorable responses to the circulars sent out that the 22d of May was fixed as the date for holding the convention.
