IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The railroad land grant forfeiture bill was taken up, the question being on Mr. Call's motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill was passed.

The bill was then reconsidered and the bill again brought before the Senate.

The necessary amendment to protect preemption and homestead claimants was then offered by Mr. Spooner and agreed to.

Mr. Call offered an amendment confirming the titles of purchasers of certain railroad land in Florida adjacent to parts of railroad lines constructed within the time limited in the granting act.

Mr. Plumb moved to amend the amendment by adding a proviso that a mortgage or pledge of land by any railroad companies should be considered as a sale.

Mr. Call accepted the proviso. Mr. Call's amendment was agreed to, and the bill passed.

Mr. Allison, from the committee on Appropriations, reported back the pension appropriation bill, and the bill making appropriations to enable the executive departments to participate in the Centennial Exposition of the Ohio Valley and the Central States in Cincinnati, from July to October, 1888, and gave notice that he would ask the Senate to consider these bills next Monday.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Creary, of Kentucky, submitted the conference report on the joint resolution authorizing the President to arrange a conference for the purpose of promoting reciprocal commercial relations between the United States of America and the Republics of Mexico and Central and South America, and the Empire of Brazil. Adopted.

The explanatory report of the House conference states that the only important change in the resolution is that the ten delegates on behalf of the United States shall be appointed by the President. In the resolution, as it passed originally, the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House were authorized to appoint two members of their respective bodies to act as delegates. The appointment of the other six delegates was virtually in the President.

Mr. Sayers, of Texas, called up the bill making an appropriation of \$450,000 to supply the deficiency in the appropriation for the expenses of collecting revenue from customs for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1888. There is a clause in the bill repealing the permanent appropriation for the collection of customs.

On motion of Mr. Sayers, an amendment was adopted appropriating \$3,500,000 to supply the deficiency in the appropriation for the payment of army and navy pensions to invalid widows and survivors of the war of 1812.

STATE NEWS.

Greenville Reflector: The meeting in the Methodist Church is being continued this week with much interest. Up to and including the Monday night services there had been thirty-two conversions. Of this number thirteen have joined the Methodist Church, five the Disciples Church and two the Baptist Church.

Chatham Record: Mrs. John Hearse, of this county, has a drumstick that was used at the battle of Guilford Court-House, during the Revolutionary war, by her father, Rufford Boon, who was a drummer in the militia. — Persimmon trees are now the most valuable trees about here, and can readily be sold at good prices at the shuttle mill. One of our countrymen, Mr. T. W. Hill, sold one persimmon tree here, a few days ago, for \$2.25 and then had one piece left at home that was worth 85 cents, so that the whole tree was worth over \$3. At such prices it might pay to plant persimmon orchards about the State!

Asheville Sun: Rev. Mr. Pearson said yesterday that nowhere in all his travels had he found a better and more moral toned press than that of North Carolina. — Although it rained without ceasing last night, there were between fifteen hundred and eighteen hundred persons at the Tabernacle to hear Mr. Pearson. This shows the interest our people take in the meetings.

Charlotte Chronicle: Darbya umbellata. Specimens of this rare plant, now in flower, which, it is said, no mortal eye has ever seen before, is on exhibition for two days only. Ladies and scientists are respectfully invited to call and examine this newly discovered plant, by Prof. M. E. Hyams, which he found within a few miles of Charlotte. It is the intention of the discoverer to present specimens to all the large herbarians throughout the world, and to many distinguished botanists, many of whom are quite enthusiastic over this discovery, which, having been assiduously searched for since the demise of the late Rev. M. A. Curtis, but quite unsuccessful, until found last Fall by the above named botanist.

Raleigh News and Observer: Gov. Scales leaves this morning for Petersburg, Va., having accepted a special invitation to meet Gov. Lee, of Virginia, to-day, at the occasion of the annual Southern Musical Festival at Petersburg. The Governor will return Saturday. — Yesterday about noon Jim Young, colored, chief clerk in the office of the Register of Deeds, had a difficulty with an old colored man named Frank Johnson at Strickland's store, on the corner of Blount and Cabarrus streets. The trouble grew out of certain reports that Young alleged Johnson had circulated about him. During the dispute Young produced a pistol and fired at Johnson, whereupon the latter turned and fled. Young fired two more shots, one of which took effect in Johnson's left shoulder, causing a flesh wound which is thought not to be fatal.

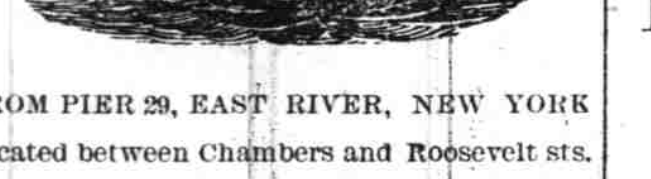
