IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, May 15.—On motion of Mr. Morrill the Committee on Finance was authorized to sit during the sessions of the Senate to take testimony, collect information (in relation to the tariff), and employ a stenographer.

Mr. Blair introduced a joint resolution to amend the Constitution so as to allow the District of Columbia representation in both Houses of Congress. Read twice, and referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. It will probably not come up again until next session.

House bills appropriating \$100,000 for a public building at Columbus, Georgia, and increasing the limit of cost for a public building at Charleston, S. C., to \$300,000, were taken from the calendar and passed.

The bill to limit the hours of letter carriers (House bill) was taken up and passed without discussion or division. It provides that hereafter eight hours shall constitute a day's work for letter carriers in cities or postal districts connected therewith, and allows them extra pay for over time.

The House bill to establish a Department of Labor was taken up, laid aside informally, and the pension appropriation bill was considered.

The amendment reported by the Committee on Appropriations, increasing the amount from \$79,000,000 to \$80,473,000, was agreed to. The next amendment was to strike out of the House bill the words "that in all pensions to widows payments shall be made from date of death of the husband," and to insert in lieu of it the following, "that all pensions which have been or which may hereafter be granted under the general laws regulating pensions to widows, in consequence of death occurring from a cause which operated in service since the fourth of March, 1861, shall commence from the date of death of the husband."

A long discussion followed, turning upon the right of the Senate to originate appropriation bills and upon the binding force of the rules against general legislation on appropriation bills. Finally, the presiding officer submitted the point of order to the Senate, and the Senate decided that the proposed amendment was in order. The Democrats generally voted in the negative and were joined in their vote by Senators Edmunds and Ingalls.

After further discussion as to the probable cost of the proposed change in the law, another brief debate was had on the department of labor bill. Without finishing the debate, the Senate went into executive session and at 5:35 adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Debate on the tariff bill was resumed and continued to the evening session.

Wadesboro Messenger: Mrs. Rebecca Galloway, of Montgomery county, died suddenly of heart disease on the 4th inst. She was about 81 years old. On last Saturday there were 56 bales of cotton sold from the wagons in this place, and the receipts for the week amounted to 101 bales. The Wadesboro Silk Factory is no longer a dream. It is a reality. Yesterday at 3 o'clock, in the presence of a number of our citizens, the Mayor of Wadesboro, Capt. John M. Little, started the machinery in motion, and hereafter our citizens will go about their daily business cheered with the music of the reel and spindles.

Charlotte Chronicle: Bishop Lyman conducted confirmation services in both the white and colored Episcopal churches of Charlotte. At St. Peter's Church twenty persons were confirmed, and at St. Michael's, the colored church, twelve persons were confirmed. Prof. Albert Rouse, who held the position of music teacher at the Charlotte Female Institute for two years past, dropped dead, from heart disease, at the residence of Mr. R. E. Cochran, corner of College and Eighth streets, at six o'clock last Sunday afternoon. Prof. Rouse and his wife boarded with Mr. Cochran, whose residence adjoins the block on which the Institute is located. At the time the summons came to him, he was sitting in a chair conversing with Mr. Cochran and others around him. His conversation was bright and he seemed to be in the best of spirits, and it was when listening to a remark made by Mr. Cochran, that a pailor suddenly overspread his face, and he dropped forward dead. Mr. Jasper Alexander, who read the item in the Chronicle a few days ago about Mr. A. L. Williams and the old uniform, says that it recalls to his mind the fight at Turkey Ridge, when Williams was shot through the neck and throat and laid out for dead in the same uniform that he wore here at the reunion of veterans. Mr. Jasper Alexander and Mr. W. W. Alexander found Mr. Williams lying in a dying condition with a bullet hole through his neck. They laid him out in a tent and procured a cup of water passed it to his lips, but all the water ran out the hole in the neck and none went down his throat until they secured a spoon and passed it down his throat below the point of the wound. After this they left him, as they thought, to die, but he recovered and is known as one of Mecklenburg's best citizens.
