D., of Boston, Massachusetts, who for the past eight years has been engaged in educational work through all the Southern States, arrived in the city yesterday and is the guest of Supt. E. P. Moses. Dr. Mayo will spend the coming three weeks in the State and deliver an address before the Teachers' Assembly at Morehead City on June 14th, besides other engagements as opportunity occurs. He is now on his return from a six months tour, including Florida, Georgia and South Carolina.
