


The wrath of the whirlpool rapids at Niagara is to be tempted again on the 4th of July, the adventurer this time being one Robert W. Flack, of Syracuse, N. Y., who has invented a life-boat of peculiar pattern. The "Phantom," as he has named his craft, has a keel 15 feet long, a beam of nearly 5 feet, and a depth of about 34- inches. A stern wheel, with brass blades is worked by a

shaft and erank in the hands of the boatman seated amidships. The boatman is fastened to his seat by straps, so that no pitching or tossing can throw him overboard against age on Manhood, Ners his will. The boat is decked over ous and Physical De nearly its entire surface, but for the usual air chambers Mr. Flack has substituted cushions of a materia' lighter than cork and entirely waterproof, so that, even if crushed against rocks, the boat cannot be sunk. The rudder is worked by cords under control of the boatman.

The whole affair does not weigh more than five hundred pounds, and it is intended not merely as an exhibition craft, but as a practical lifeboat for use at sea. The inventor's object in launching it at Niagara is

to give it what he believes to be the severest test possible.

The New York World, referring to the passage of the bill by the Bra zilian Senate abolishing slavery, says that "this ends the long struggle for emancipation in the empire, and leaves Cuba and Porto Rico the only territories in the New World in which the traffic in human beings is legalized. The Emperor, Dom Pe-

dro, has been an earnest champion of emancipation. The abolition movement began late in the sixties. It found its first legal expression in 1871 in a law which practica ly freed children born of slaves, and which freed'all the State's slaves, 1,600 in Office. number. Under this law 1,540,796 slaves registered in 1873 dwindled down to 1,233,195 in 1884. In 1885 the Liberals again came into power, and in September a law freeing at once all slaves over 60 years old and emancipating all others by classes gradually was passed. Under it the slave owners were to have compensation for their loss, and it was expected that by 1892 there would be no more slaves to free under the law. The passage of the law of 1883 has hastened this consummation by aboul four years. In March, 1887. there were 723,419 slaves in Brazil, worth \$240,000,000. At this time there are probably not more than 600,000, worth \$200,000,000.
