IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

**SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, June 4.—Mr. Hale reported the Consular and Diplomatic Appropriation bill.  
On motion of Mr. Sherman it was ordered that during this week the Senate will proceed to the consideration of bills on the calendar and appropriation bills, and that the special orders shall be continued till next Monday.  
The Senate proceeded to the consideration of bills on the calendar, and passed, among others, the following bills:  
Senate bill appropriating \$30,000 for the extension of the public building at Lynchburg, Va.  
Senate bill appropriating \$5,000 for an addition to the public building at Jackson, Miss.  
The Senate at 4 o'clock adjourned, having passed in all 78 bills, 40 of which were pension bills.

**HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.**  
Mr. Mills moved that the rules be suspended and a resolution passed, setting apart evening sessions for the consideration of bills reported by committees, as follows: Saturday, June 9th, Committee on Public Lands; Monday, June 11th, Committee on Military Affairs; Tuesday, June 12th, Pacific Railroads; Wednesday, June 13th, Territories; Thursday, June 14th, Saturday, June 15th and 16th, Commerce; Tuesday, July 10th, Territories.  
The House at 3 o'clock adjourned.  
A bill was introduced in the House to-day by Mr. Oates, of Alabama, to restrict the immigration of foreigners into the United States. It also imposes a tax of \$25 on each immigrant. Diplomatic representatives are excepted.

The County Commissioners and Board of Magistrates met here today in Joint Session to levy the taxes for this year, after which the Board of Magistrates proceeded to elect three County Commissioners, viz J. T. Foy, H. A. Bland and A. C. Moore. L. H. McClammy, Esq., was elected Chairman of the Board of Magistrates.

The strawberry season is about played out, shippers have stopped shipping and turned their attention to other pursuits, whortleberries are plentiful and if you were here some Saturday you'd imagine that you were in old Sampson, in the midst of the "big blues."

Politics are beginning to draw upon the imagination of our people. We all rejoice at the renomination of our gallant standard-bearer, Maj. McClammy, though we expected the same, for when a public servant goes ahead and discharges his duties as the Major has it would be regretful in his constituents, not to acknowledge his services by sending him back to Congress, where he works so assiduously for them and watches the interest of the whole nation.  
Our people are beginning to consider who shall represent them in the next Legislature, and all the county offices generally. Frow prescient indications it seems that Geo. A. Ramsey, Esq., is the choice of the people for the Legislature. He would make a bold and aggressive campaign and an excellent representative.

representative. A. H. Paddison, Esq., is also spoken of, and will no doubt receive the nomination, for a sheriff at the coming Convention. There could not be a better selection made for the two positions than these two gentlemen, both men of intelligence, energy and splendid business capacity. Mr. Paddison has never been defeated for any office in the county, notwithstanding he was a candidate for sheriff for two terms and was elected while the Republicans were largely in the majority. He gave general satisfaction while he was sheriff and every person who had dealings with him admired him for his manly way of doing business. In fact he is a practical business man, and the people of Fender would be guarding their interest to elect him sheriff.
