 IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
 WASHINGTON, June 12.—Mr. Chandler offered a resolution referring the credentials of Senator Gibson, of Louisiana, (for his new term), to the Committee on Privileges and Elections, and instructing that committee to inquire into all the facts of the Senatorial election, and to ascertain and report whether or not, at the recent State election in Louisiana, which included the election of the State Legislature, the 138,746 votes returned for the candidate of the dominant party for Governor, were actually cast, in view of the fact that at no previous election had the votes for the candidate of such party exceeded 88,794; and why, in the parish of Madison, 2,976 to 5; in Morehouse, 1,484 to 14; in Ouachita, 2,994 to 5; in Sabine, 1,441 to 2; in Tensas, 4,627 to 113; with similar returns from other parishes. Also to ascertain and report, whether or not, at such State election, there was any violence, intimidation or fraud that prevented a fair election and whether false returns were made and counted. In case the committee shall conclude that there were illegalities, frauds, false canvasses and false returns, so extensive and systematic in their character as to show a deliberate plan to carry the election without regard to the votes actually cast, and to choose the Governor, State officers and State Legislature by such illegal, false and fraudulent means, then the committee is instructed to proceed further and enquire and report whether the Legislature was actually and duly elected by the people of Louisiana, or was in fact solely the creation of the returning and canvassing officers; and whether the State of Louisiana had, on the 23d of May, 1888, the day of Senator Gibson's election, a republican form of government, including a Legislature entitled to choose United States Senators. Laid over till to-morrow.

The bill to amend the Inter-State Commerce law was taken up, and Mr. Cullom took the floor with a long and carefully prepared speech in explanation and advocacy of it. At the close of Mr. Cullom's speech the Senate proceeded to the consideration of the Fortification Appropriation bill, and was addressed by Mr. Dolph on the subject of coast defenses.

The bill went over without action and the District of Columbia appropriation bill was taken up and discussed to adjournment.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
 The House spent two hours and a half discussing the resolution reported yesterday from the Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads, calling on the Postmaster General for a tabulated statement of disallowed postmasters' claims presented from the State of Kentucky under the act of March, 1883. The report on the resolution is an adverse one, and the recommendation is that it lie upon the table. The report was finally agreed to.

The contested election cases of Frank vs. Glover, of Missouri, and Lynch vs. Vandever, of California, were disposed of by concurring in the reports of the Elections Committee, awarding the seats to the sitting members.

The House then went into Committee of the Whole on the tariff bill.

STATE NEWS.
 Rockingham Spirit: A very malignant form of dysentery is prevailing, with very fatal effect, in the lower edge of this county and upper part of Marlboro county, S. C., no less than 18 deaths having occurred from it in and about Brightsville within the space of two weeks.

Fayetteville Journal: The Knights of Honor have this day paid \$2,000 to the Administrator of the late William Taylor, who was a member of that order. — Mr. Edmund Robinson, formerly of this city, but now of the United States Fish Commission, arrived here last Friday afternoon with 1,800,000 young shad for the Cape Fear river. These fish were taken down to the river the same afternoon and deposited in the muddy waters of the Cape Fear.

Raleigh News and Observer: Mr. Thos. Huntley, a well-to-do young farmer, living eight miles east of Lenoir, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself through the head with his rifle. No cause is known. — A difficulty occurred near Hendersonville Saturday between John Jenkins and Larry Freeman. Freeman stabbed Jenkins, from which Jenkins died this morning. The facts are not obtainable as to the cause. Both were drinking. — On Saturday night, at Matthews, a crowd of drunken rowdies were creating a great disturbance on the street, and when Town Marshal Hurley attempted to arrest them he was openly resisted. One of the rowdies, named Bowden, drew a pistol and threatened him in a violent manner. Officer Hurley was compelled to shoot him in defense of himself and the laws of the town, which he did with a shot gun carried by one of his deputies. Bowden was painfully if not dangerously wounded, over four hundred shot taking effect in his shoulder and neck. Officer Hurley says his conscience is clear.

 Fifteen hundred circulars of the Newton Normal School have been distributed among the Public School teachers of the State. The term of 1888 will begin July 5th and close July 27th. The faculty is composed of North Carolina teachers of eminence and culture, and the term promises to be of unusual interest to teachers.


