Last night was an ideally perfect Summer night. It was as pleasant as it was pretty.

Indications.

For North Carolina, slightly cooler, followed to-night by fair weather and stationary temperature.

There was a good time at the Pavilion at the Hummocks last night. The young folks tripped the light fantastic to their hearts' content.

The Queen has changed her schedule slightly. She will hereafter during the Encampment leave Southport at 3 p. m. instead of 4 p. m.

The First Regiment, Col. Jno. W. Cotten, commanding, is the largest in camp. The Edgewood Guards, in this regiment, has the largest roll call. There are 57 men present.

It seems that everybody and his wife and sweetheart went to the Sound last night. There were large crowds at Manning's and Stokley's and dancing in the pavilions at both places.

The Sylvan Grove carried 400 visitors to Carolina Beach yesterday. Over 200 went down, in the afternoon, and our guests all express themselves as highly delighted with the trip and the beach.

The Passport will make another dime excursion to-night, but this time the run will be 15 miles down the river; nearly to the Rocks, and return. This will give 30 miles of a delightful moonlight ride for 10 cents.

Prayer meeting to-morrow (Saturday) at 8:15 p. m. at Seaman's Bethel. Visiting military and strangers cordially invited to attend. Mr. W. P. Fife, who drew such a crowded house several weeks ago at the Bethel, will be in attendance.

By the kind consent of the owners and lessees the Custom House wharf and the two wharves just north of Princess street, which belong to the Navassa Guano Co. and Messrs. Geo. Harriss, Son & Co. will be reserved for the use of the military during the marine display on Tuesday next.

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For Carolina Beach.

Besides the regular trip to Carolina Beach to-day—at 9:30 a. m. and 3 p. m.—the Sylvan Grove will make a moonlight excursion, with music for dancing and a grand display of fireworks on the boat. The steamer will leave her wharf at 8 o'clock, and returning, the train will leave the Beach at 11 p. m.

There will be a good time at Carolina Beach to-night. The Sylvan Grove will run down there on a moonlight excursion, leaving here at 8 o'clock and returning about midnight. One of the attractions at the Beach will be a grand display of fireworks, and there will be a good supper, bathing and dancing for those so inclined.

THE N. C. STATE GUARD.

Third Day of the Encampment.

The third day of the Encampment dawned bright and auspicious but the forenoon soon became overcast and there was a heavy down pour of rain, the first drop the boys have had—outside—since they went into camp. The rain necessarily caused a suspension of the drills and all but the poor unfortunate fellows who happened to be on sentinel duty at that hour made a break for shelter. The routine of camp duty was, however, thoroughly preserved.

There were no items of interest in and about the camp during the forenoon, the heavy rain having washed out almost the semblance of military life. The appointments for to-day were as follows:

The following orders were read at dress parade yesterday afternoon and went into effect this morning:

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 13.
HEAD'RS N. C. STATE GUARD,
CAMP PENDER,
WRIGHTSVILLE, N. C., July 19, '88.)

I. While each Regiment will have its own guard lines, as heretofore ordered, with the view of diminishing the burdens of guard duty, the guard lines will be restricted to the exterior line of the camp, and such extra posts as may be established.

II. For the purpose of instruction, double details for guard duty will be made each day.

III. The First Regiment will maintain four posts, including the eastern, which will be maintained only between retreat and guard mounting. The Second Regiment will maintain three posts; the Third Regiment four posts; the Fourth Regiment four posts, including the hospital, which will be mounted both day and night. Guards will be mounted at retreat and relieved at guard mounting, except the post at the hospital.

IV. After tattoo men will return to their respective camps by way of guard tent posts of their respective regiments, avoiding the sentinels of other regiments, so as to disturb no one except the sentinel above designated.

V. Between retreat and guard mounting no person except such as possess the countersign will be allowed to leave camp without permission from the regimental commander.

VI. Regimental commanders are charged to see that guard duty is properly performed in accordance with regulations, existing orders and approved customs of service, as instruction in this very important branch of military duty is one of the principal objects of this Encampment.

The Big Marine Parade.

Capt. E. D. Williams and Geo. M. Crapon, the committee appointed to arrange for the Marine Parade which is to take place in this city next Tuesday, have labored very zealously and have secured 23 steamers for the parade, besides Capt. Williams' boat, the Marie, as starter, and the Colfax invited. The following programme is submitted for the occasion:

Steamer Marie, Capt. E. D. Williams, will act as the starting boat and to see that the line is kept in order.

ROUTE OF BOATS—Starting from Point Peter, proceeding in mid-stream down the river. When the leading boat is opposite Market Dock, at a signal from the Marie, each boat will give one long blast of the steam whistle, also one long blast of the steam whistle when opposite the Crescote Works. Proceeding down the river to Black Buoy, opposite the Dram Tree, rounding the buoy, turning from the Eastward to Westward, following the west side of the river up opposite to the Champion Compress. As each boat arrives opposite the Compress it will give three blasts of the steam whistle, turn and proceed to its dock.

All boats are requested to display all of their bunting. It is especially requested that all boats will use extraordinary caution while in the line and when breaking line, give the proper signals at the proper time, in order to avoid any accident.

The Fire This Afternoon.

Solicitor Moore appeared for the State and there was no counsel for the defendant. He was found guilty and sentenced to ten years in the State Penitentiary.
