The Governor will review the troops this afternoon from the balcony of the Orton House, which has been engaged for this purpose.

There is good walking from the business quarters all of the way to the Seacoast R. R. station at Tenth and Princess streets. A good sidewalk of sawdust has recently been constructed from Ninth to Tenth street.

A mass meeting of the officers and men of the State Guard was to have been held to-day to consider the matter of the annual State encampment and to give expression to some opinion in regard to a permanent location for the camp, but it was postponed until to-morrow.

To See the Parade.
The steamer *Passport* brought 150 passengers from Southport this morning to witness the parade this afternoon. The steamer *Louise* also brought up a large crowd. In all, the Southport contingent is nearly 200 strong.

It is to be greatly regretted that Capt. Anthony's splendid troop of cavalrymen will not be mounted this afternoon. The announcement made this morning that the parade would not be made played the wild with their expectations. They will be in the line, dismounted.

An invitation has been extended to Gov. Scales and suite to visit Carolina Beach before leaving the city, and it is hoped that he will be able to accept. He has expressed himself as being desirous of visiting this noted seaside resort, can he so arrange it during his brief visit here and it is hoped that he will be able to accept the invitation.

The Crescent Opera Company, assisted by some of our local talent, will give a concert at Manning's Pavilion, Wrightsville Sound, to-morrow. There is a good stage at the Pavilion, with dressing rooms attached and room for seating several hundred persons. There will probably be a large attendance.

Devotional Meeting.
A devotional meeting of the Y. M. C. A. will be held to-night at 8:20 o'clock, promptly, in the rooms of the Library Association, on Market street, between Front and Second. Visitors are cordially invited to be present, and especially is the invitation urged upon the visiting, and resident, military.

The Troops will Parade.
After all it has been decided to bring the troops here for a parade this afternoon. This determination has been arrived at this morning; the previous order having been revoked after a full consultation between the Governor and his subordinates. At this writing the route has not been fully determined upon, but the troops will debark at Market street and parade through Market and Front, to be reviewed by the Governor.

Knights Templar.
Wilmington Commandery No. 1, Knights Templar, had a pleasant meeting last night at their asylum in the Masonic building, at which they entertained as their guests, Col. Carl A. Woodruff, Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of North Carolina, and Mr. E. M. McRae, Grand Captain General of the Grand Commandery of this State, and others. Great interest has recently been aroused in this Commandery, and this meeting was the occasion of initiating five candidates, which will doubtless infuse new life into the order.

The Fireman's Visit.
Chief Oldenbottle, Assistant Chief Newman, and the heads of the various white fire companies in this city, accompanied by the Germania Cornet Band, paid their promised visit to the Encampment yesterday afternoon. They were most cordially received by Col. W. C. Jones, of the Second Regiment, and were by them escorted to Gen. Jones' headquarters and introduced to that officer and his staff. The band played for the Second Regiment at dress parade yesterday afternoon and the music they rendered received many warm commendations. They will also play for the Second in the parade this afternoon.

Sketch of Charlotte.
We received some days ago, with compliments of the Charlotte *Chronicle*, a copy of a handsome pamphlet entitled, "Sketches of Charlotte, the Queen City of the Old North State, and Mecklenburg, the Banner County." It is neatly gotten up, profusely illustrated, and displays an enterprise which must eventuate in great advantage to our sister city. Our friend Wade Harris had much to do with its compilation. It is a good thing for the live, go-ahead people of our sister city and we are glad to know that there is a great demand for it from every section of the country.

The Marine Display.
The army and the navy both have a showing this afternoon. The navy has had theirs and the army will march through the streets long after our paper has been put to press. The whole town has capitulated and surrendered at discretion and that without the firing of a gun.

The marine parade was a very handsome affair and was witnessed by an immense throng, which lined the wharves and the porticos and even the tops of the buildings on the river front. It was a very creditable affair, well planned and well executed. The fleet did not start until nearly 4 o'clock, as the arrival of the Governor was awaited. His Excellency got here just after the last boat had passed Market street dock and was taken immediately on board the revenue cutter *Colfax*, where he could review the boats on their return up the river.

Sale of Real Estate.
Messrs. Cronly & Morris sold at auction to-day ten unimproved lots on Chestnut, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, each 33x165, for \$165 each. Also, the residence of the late Col. W. S. Devane, on Second, between Ann and Nun streets, for \$1,650. Also, store No. 12 Market street, for \$2,900. These are all considered good sales. They were made subject to confirmation.

The Governor's Arrival.
His Excellency, Gov. Scales, arrived here last night on the 7:40 p. m. train from the North. He was met at the depot by Hon. George Davis, Hon. R. R. Bridgers, Col. F. W. Kerchner, Mayor Fowler, Dr. Geo. G. Thomas and Messrs. Wm. Latimer, H. C. McQueen, J. A. Bonitz, F. H. Stedman and Josh. T. James, a committee appointed for the purpose on behalf of the citizens, and was by a portion of this committee escorted to the Sound, in Col. Bridgers' private car, which had been tendered for the purpose. The Governor's Guard, under command of Capt. Harrell, came up from the camp for escort duty, and Capt. Benehan Cameron, of the Governor's staff, met the Governor on his arrival here and accompanied him to Wrightsville. His Excellency, who appears, we are pleased to note, in excellent health, was accompanied by Mrs. Scales, Mr. Donald W. Bain, State Treasurer, and Mr. C. H. Arnfield, the Governor's private secretary. Gen. W. P. Roberts, State Auditor, who was also to have been of the party, was sick and unable to come.

Arrived at Wrightsville the Governor was met by Lieut. Gov. Stedman, whose guest he is, Adjutant General Jones, Col. F. H. Cameron, Col. F. A. Olds, and others, and was driven to Lieut. Gov. Stedman's delightful Summer residence on the Sound. Here he was considerably allowed to rest after the fatigue of the journey, everything like a public reception being postponed until to-day. While at supper His Excellency was serenaded by the Durham Cornet Band and afterwards there was a display of fireworks.

Confeds in Council.
A meeting of Confederate veterans was held last night at the City Court room, to receive the report of a committee appointed last Friday to arrange for a visit to the State Guard encamped at Wrightsville. Maj. T. D. Loye presided, with Capt. A. L. DeRosset secretary. There were about fifty ex-Confederate veterans present. The committee made the following report:

Your committee beg to report that they have met Gen. Jones and stated the object of the meeting of Confederate veterans held here on Friday last. Gen. Jones expressed his pleasure at the object of our visit and on consultation will receive the veterans on Wednesday evening next at 6 o'clock at the camp.

The committee beg further to report that they arranged with the railroad company to have separate cars set aside for the ex-Confederates and that arrangements have been made for a handsome badge and a round trip ticket, the whole to cost not over forty-five cents.

The committee moreover recommend that the veterans meet at the Orton House at 4:30 Wednesday afternoon to take the 5 p. m. train for Camp Pender, and that the senior ex-Confederate officer take command and name the next two seniors as assistants.

On motion of Capt. A. L. DeRosset the report was received and the recommendations adopted. Upon motion of Col. F. W. Kerchner a committee, consisting of Col. William L. DeRosset, Lt. Col. Jno. D. Taylor and Capt. T. C. Lewis, was appointed to settle the question of the seniority of rank among the old officers, so that it can be determined as to who is to be the commander of the Veterans.

Remarks were made by Col. W. L. DeRosset, who urged a large turnout of all veterans of the Confederate Army, regardless of the residence or appointment from any State. It was moved by Col. Taylor that a committee be appointed to prepare suitable badges, and to request that all ex-Confederates report to either of the committee by 8 o'clock to-night. Capt. J. H. Currie and Lieutenant B. F. White were appointed such committee.

Unity Tent No. 60, I. O. R., will give an excursion on Thursday on the steamer *Queen of St. John's* to points of interest near the mouth of the river. Messrs. C. D. Jacobs, C. L. Cowles, C. H. Keen and J. T. Sholar form the committee of arrangements.

The Steele Creek Band, from Mecklenburg, last night paid a visit to Summer Rest and serenaded the people there. They discoursed some beautiful music and were hospitably entertained by the residents.

A change of schedule goes into effect to-morrow on the C. C. R. R. The day train will leave here at 8 a. m., and arrive at 7:30 p. m., and the night train will leave at 7:30 and arrive at 7:45. The train between Wilmington and Charlotte has been reduced 1 hour and 20 minutes. The corrected schedule will appear to-morrow.

Boykin, of Sampson county, Judge of the Superior Court who was here a few days since on a visit to our seacoast resorts, has gone to New York on a business visit.

Why the Order Was Revoked.
We understand that the Governor was induced to revoke his order in regard to the parade in the city this afternoon in consequence of petitions signed by the troops in camp. As soon as they heard last night that he had decided against the parade they began to circulate petitions begging him to revoke his order and to allow the parade to take place. These were presented this morning and on the strength of these the former order was revoked and a fresh order for the parade was issued.


