About Cutting Down Weeds.
We have long been of the opinion that weeds were not actually unhealthy during the summer season and that it is better to let them alone, rather than have them cut down and carted off under a hot sun, and we are glad to have this opinion confirmed by Dr. Wood. This matter was submitted to him to-day and he has furnished us with the following opinion:

Actively growing weeds do no harm. They absorb water from the soil, draining it to a certain extent and giving off oxygen, and this latter process goes on from the most unsightly and noxious weeds. Therefore it is better to leave them standing in August than to cut them down, thereby laying bare the soil, and causing malarial emanations from it. Later on, just before the weeds begin to die, they should be cut and carted right away.

Weeds should be prevented in February and March by thoroughly weeding as the seed come up.

Our neighboring town of Southport has quarantined against the fever infected district and a notice to that effect is published in this issue. This is well. The quarantine here is to a great extent protective to Southport but that town is open to travelers by sea and inland and it is well enough to take precautions to prevent the introduction of disease there.

Judge Russell's "Savages."
"The Independent Republican Party of New Hanover County" met to-day in the County Court House and was called to order at 12 m.

Three cheers were then given for the nominees and Judge Russell's "Savages."

Quarantine at Southport
ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHPORT, that after the 17th day of August, 1888, no refugees from any of the infected towns of Florida, south of Waycross, shall be allowed to enter the Town of Southport, either by land or water, unless they are provided with certificates showing that they have passed through the quarantines along the route, and have been allowed free pratique by the officials in charge.

Ordered, That the Captains of all passenger lines be notified that no person or baggage will be allowed to land from their boats, except such as are allowed free pratique in the City of Wilmington.

Ordered, That any person entering the town of Southport from any of the towns of Florida, south of Waycross, either by land or water, in violation of the letter and spirit of the foregoing orders, shall be subject to a fine of \$50, or imprisonment for thirty days, or both at the discretion of the Mayor, after conviction of the aforesaid offence.

BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE COUNTY OF NEW HANOVER.
THOMAS F. WOOD, M. D., Secretary.
WILMINGTON, N. C., Aug. 10, 1888.

WHEREAS, It has come to the knowledge of the County Board of Health of the County of New Hanover that yellow fever exists in Jacksonville, Fla.,

It is hereby declared by the said Board that inland quarantine shall be established this day upon the railroads leading into this city by authority of the general statutes, Code, Sec. 2883.

It is hereby ordered that two detectives shall be stationed at Meares Bluff, who shall thoroughly examine every "sleeper," and other passenger coaches, forfidding any persons coming from Jacksonville or towns south of that point entering Wilmington.

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed to wait on the railroad authorities to consult with them in order to perfect such plans as will thoroughly carry out a sufficient quarantine.

Ordered, that the above resolutions and orders shall be made public.
