IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Mr. Beck offered as an amendment to the House tariff bill, an additional section, suspending until further order of Congress all laws relating to the sinking fund, and had it referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Beck also introduced a bill to repeal all laws relating to the sinking fund, and asked that it lie on the table until he could see what would become of his amendment to the tariff bill.

After some discussion the bill was read a first and second time, and laid on the table.

The Senate then, on motion of Mr. Call, proceeded to the consideration of the joint resolution appropriating \$200,000 to suppress infection in the interstate commerce of the United States.

Discussion on the epidemic joint resolution was continued at much length. The committee substitute was amended in several particulars and adopted, and the bill passed. It now reads: "That in addition to the unexpended balance of the fund heretofore appropriated, the sum of two hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated to be immediately available, to be expended in the discretion of the President of the United States in aid of State or municipal boards of health, or otherwise, by such means as he shall deem best, to prevent the introduction of cholera or yellow fever into the United States from foreign countries, or into one State or Territory from another, or into the District of Columbia, from any State or Territory, or into any State or Territory from said District."

Mr. Wilson, of Iowa, gave notice that he would tomorrow ask the Senate to proceed to the consideration of the report of the Judiciary Committee on the Jackson, (Miss.) election.

Mr. Chandler called up his resolution heretofore offered, in relation to fraud and violence in the last Louisiana election, and proceeded to address the Senate thereon.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Mr. Townsend, of Illinois, presented the conference report upon the Army Appropriation bill and explained it.

Pending debate the further consideration of the report was postponed until tomorrow, and Mr. Herbert, of Alabama, presented the conference report on the Naval Appropriation bill. Mr. Herbert stated that as agreed to in conference the bill provided for four cruisers and three gunboats. As it passed the House it provided for three unarmored cruisers and one armored cruiser. The Senate had stricken out the provision for the armored cruiser, and in lieu thereof provided for three gunboats. The House conferees had insisted upon gunboats. The conference committee had determined to provide for both. After a brief discussion the conference report was agreed to without division.

The House then went into Committee of the Whole on the Deficiency Appropriation bill.

Mr. Burns, of Missouri, offered an amendment appropriating \$562,488 to meet the deficiency for the inland transportation of mails on railroad routes. Agreed to.

Mr. Butterworth, of Ohio, asked unanimous consent to offer an amendment appropriating \$10,000 for the benefit of the widow of the late Chief Justice Waite.

Mr. McMullen, of Tennessee, objected.

Mr. Burns then raised the point of order upon the first paragraph of the French spoliation claim section. The point was that although the House had directed the items to be reported in the bill, that action had been taken before the rules were adopted, and that consequently by the adoption of rules forbidding the attachment of legislation to appropriation bills, the former order was revoked. Discussion upon this point occupied the remainder of the day's session, and without disposing of it the House at 5 o'clock adjourned.

He attacked the whole lot and killed seventy, three large ones and sixty-seven small ones. They were of the copperhead variety—a very poisonous snake. — While Mr. J. A. Setzer was grubbing near his home in Patterson township Tuesday of last week, being nearly blind he could not see a rattlesnake that was coiled up between his feet until his little boy came up behind him and informed him that he was standing over it. He jumped out of the way and called a neighbor, who killed the snake. It was three feet long and had five rattles.

BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE COUNTY OF NEW HANOVER.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Aug. 10, 1888.

WHEREAS, It has come to the knowledge of the County Board of Health of the County of New Hanover that yellow fever exists in Jacksonville, Fla.,

It is hereby declared by the said Board that inland quarantine shall be established this day upon the railroads leading into this city by authority of the general statutes, Code, Sec. 2883.

It is hereby ordered that two detectives shall be stationed at Meares' Bluff, who shall thoroughly examine every "sleeper," and other passenger coaches, forbidding any persons coming from Jacksonville or towns south of that point entering Wilmington.

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed to wait on the railroad authorities to consult with them in order to perfect such plans as will thoroughly carry out a sufficient quarantine.

Ordered, That the above resolutions and orders shall be made public.

Quarantine at Southport
ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS of the Town of Southport, that after the 17th day of August, 1888, no refugees from any of the infected towns of Florida, south of Waycross, shall be allowed to enter the Town of Southport, either by land or water, unless they are provided with certificates showing that they have passed through the quarantines along the route, and have been allowed free pratique by the officials in charge.

Ordered, That the Captains of all passenger lines be notified that no person or baggage will be allowed to land from their boats, except such as are allowed free pratique in the City of Wilmington.

Ordered, That any person entering the town of Southport from any of the towns of Florida, south of Waycross, either by land or water, in violation of the letter and spirit of the foregoing orders, shall be subject to a fine of \$50, or imprisoned for thirty days, or both at the discretion of the Mayor, after conviction of the aforesaid offence.
