Capt. Pennington will arrive to-night from New York to take charge of the steamer Fanita, whose late commander, Capt. Wm. Nelson, died yesterday at the Marine Hospital.

Jack Williams, assault with a deadly weapon, case continued.

James Tise, drunk and down, \$10 or 20 days.

William Henry, larceny, bound over to the next term of Criminal Court in the sum of \$100, justified bond.

Board of Health. A meeting of the Board of Health was held yesterday afternoon at which attention was called to the practice of digging and disturbing the surface of the earth during the summer months, which was declared detrimental to the public health.

A resolution was adopted requesting the Mayor to use every effort in his power to prevent such digging. A resolution was also adopted, declaring that the city pound in its present condition is a nuisance and a detriment to the public health.

A New Church Organized. A Missionary Baptist church, colored, was organized last Tuesday night at the corner of Dock and Twelfth streets, under the name of St. Peter's Chapel. The Revs. B. F. Brown, John Murray, Wm. Devane and H. Smith, being present, made interesting talks and gave the members of the new organization some very good and appropriate advice.

There is also, in connection with the church, a Sunday School and a sewing school, which the members of other churches take great interest in and hope to do much good among the colored people of that section of the city.

Death of Capt. Wm. Nelson. Capt. William Nelson, master of the Clyde steamer Fanita, died yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock at the United States Marine Hospital in this city. The Fanita arrived at Southport Wednesday night from New York, and was detained at quarantine until yesterday morning, when she came up to the city. On inquiry at the office of the steamship company, it was learned that Capt. Nelson was overcome with heat in New York city last Saturday, and after the vessel went to sea Monday, was taken seriously ill, continuing in this state until the steamer reached Southport. After the arrival of the Fanita here, during the afternoon Capt. Nelson was removed to the Marine Hospital for treatment, and as stated, died shortly afterwards, of apoplexy.

Capt. Nelson was one of the oldest captains in the service of the Clydes, and was well known as a skillful navigator and has a host of friends in this city who will regret to learn of his sudden death. He was 68 years of age and leaves a wife and one child, who live in New York. His body has been embalmed and will be sent to New York for burial. Mrs. Nelson is expected here to-night, having been advised by telegraph of the death of her husband.

Another Candidate for the Penitentiary. Last night about 12 o'clock a negro, whose name is William Henry, was captured in the act of robbing Portner's beer bottling establishment, on North Second street, between Market and Princess. The capture was made by Sergeant Pugh and Officers R. L. Dixon, W. R. Smith and Lewis Sallings, who had been watching the place, and entered as soon as the light in the building was extinguished. They found a man concealed up stairs between two empty crates of beer bottles, with twenty-three marked copper cents, which he had taken out of the money drawer, in his possession. The thief gained an entrance through a window in the back part of the building. There was a woman on the outside, by the name of Victoria Collins, who kept a look-out for him and gave him signals when to enter. Victoria is under arrest and will have a hearing before the Mayor to-morrow morning. Henry had been in the employ of the Portner Brewing Co. but had been discharged and is suspected of having robbed the place several times of late. Before the Mayor this morning he was bound over to the Criminal Court in a \$100 justified bond.

Official. Passed at a Meeting of New Hanover County Board of Health, Aug. 23, 1888. IT BEING THE UNANIMOUS AND DECIDED opinion of the members of the Board of Health, that any and all digging and opening of the surface of the earth and excavations, limits within the city, during the summer, are exceedingly detrimental to health, and liable to produce and breed disease; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Mayor of the city be, and he is hereby, earnestly requested to use every effort in his power to prevent any and all such digging and excavations, and to diligently prosecute all persons who have violated, or who shall in the future violate, the City Ordinance on that subject.

Resolved, That in the opinion of New Hanover County Board of Health the City Pound, in its present condition, is a nuisance and a detriment to the public health. **F. W. POTTER,** Secretary and Supt. Health.

City Ordinance Relating to The Public Health and Quarantine. SECTION 7, ARTICLE IV.

It shall not be lawful to dig up, open or disturb the surface of the earth, within the limits of the city, between the first day of June and the first day of October, in each and every year, for the purpose of paving the streets, or excavating for drains, or laying down gas or other pipes, or carrying on any other improvements, without the permission of the Superintendent of Health; any person or persons, or incorporate bodies or companies so offending, shall be fined not exceeding Fifty Dollars, for each and every offence. aug 24 1t

Quarantine Notice. BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE COUNTY OF NEW HANOVER. THOMAS F. WOOD, M. D., Secretary. WILMINGTON, N. C., Aug. 10, 1888.

WHEREAS, It has come to the knowledge of the County Board of Health of the County of New Hanover that yellow fever exists in Jacksonville, Fla.,

It is hereby declared by the said Board that inland quarantine shall be established this day upon the railroads leading into this city by authority of the general statutes, Code, Sec. 2883.

It is hereby ordered that two detectives shall be stationed at Meares' Bluff, who shall thoroughly examine every "sleeper," and other passenger coaches, forbidding any persons coming from Jacksonville or towns south of that point entering Wilmington.

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed to wait on the railroad authorities to consult with them in order to perfect such plans as will thoroughly carry out a sufficient quarantine.

Ordered, that the above resolutions and orders shall be made public. **F. W. POTTER, M. D.,** JOHN J. FOWLER, Supt. of Health. Mayor, Chm. aug 10 1t

Quarantine at Southport ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS of the Town of Southport, that after the 17th day of August, 1888, no refugees from any of the infected towns of Florida, south of Waycross, shall be allowed to enter the Town of Southport, either by land or water, unless they are provided with certificates showing that they have passed through the quarantines along the route, and have been allowed free pratique by the officials in charge.

Ordered, That the Captains of all passenger lines be notified that no person or baggage will be allowed to land from their boats, except such as are allowed free pratique in the City of Wilmington.

Ordered, That any person entering the town of Southport from any of the towns of Florida, south of Waycross, either by land or water, in violation of the letter and spirit of the foregoing orders, shall be subject to a fine of \$50, or imprisoned for thirty days, or both at the discretion of the Mayor, after conviction of the aforesaid offence.
