The C. F. & Y. V. R. R.

We clip the following from a long report in the Greensboro Patriot of a meeting in that city of the Board of Directors of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R.:

On the western extension the work has been vigorously prosecuted of reducing the grades and lightening the curves. The road-bed is in fine condition, and by the middle of October the whole force of 250 convicts can be transferred to the Wilmington extension.

The engine, built by the use and will almost immediately commence the survey west from Mt. Airy, meeting whom will come the engineers of the Norfolk & Western R. R. at some common point on the State line. Several surveys may be necessary to satisfactorily effect this, as the eastern approaches to the Blue Ridge are rugged and precipitous, although the western descent is remarkably easy and gradual. With the definite location of the line, the work of construction will go forward without delay.

On the eastern extension eight miles of the road have been graded out from Fayetteville, and between seven and eight miles from Wilmington. Over the Cape Fear river, just below the county Clarendon bridge at Fayetteville, an iron bridge will be thrown, with two centre spans of 190 feet each, and two exterior spans of 150 feet each—giving a total length of 680 feet. For this work the masonry contract will be straightway put in hand, and the President is in correspondence with different bridge builders for the superstructure. Contracts will be at once let for cross-ties throughout the whole eastern extension.

Prayer for Deliverance From Fever. Rt. Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina, has issued the following prayer to the clergy of the diocese, to be used by them each Sunday. It was yesterday read as a part of the morning prayer in St. John's Church.

O Lord of life and death, of sickness and health, our only help in time of need, we implore Thy pity upon those afflicted by the presence or approach of pestilence. Miserable sinners that we are, we know that Thou dost lay upon us no more than our sins deserve. Yet, O Heavenly Father, who hast taught us in Thy Holy Word that Thou dost not willingly afflict or grieve the children of men, regard our supplications, who are but dust and ashes before Thee. Where the destroyer has already come, abate, we beseech Thee, its violence, and graciously remove the scourge. Withhold the uplifted rod where it has not yet fallen. Bless the agencies used for relief and restoration. Sustain the sick with a sense of Thy mercy, and a saving faith in Thy Blessed Son. Bless their sickness to their spiritual good. Preserve them from the temptations of the enemy. In Thy good time restore them to health, or to such a measure of it, as to Thy may seem best for them; and enable them to lead the residue of their lives in Thy fear, and with a grateful sense of Thy deliverance. Prepare and support the dying, and make their passage safe. Console the bereaved. Give them faith to discern Thy Fatherly hand, and sanctify to them their affliction. Take into Thy gracious keeping the desolate, the fatherless, and the widow. And teach us all to feel how frail and uncertain our life is; that we may apply our hearts unto that heavenly wisdom which, in the end, will bring us to everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Indications. For North Carolina, threatening weather and rain, slightly cooler on the coast and stationary temperature in the interior.

The Crop Bulletin. The weekly weather crop bulletin, issued last Saturday, gives the following report for the week ending with that day:

In the Eastern District there was a slight deficiency of rainfall. Crops, apparently, were not unfavorably affected. In the Central District there was a marked deficiency of rainfall, with a very injurious effect upon the crops. There was an average amount of rainfall in the Western District, with a very favorable effect upon all crops.

The temperature in the Eastern and Central Districts was below the average. In the Western District there was an average temperature. There was an average amount of sunshine in all districts. The cool weather was rather unfavorable to crops.

Sheet Iron Bagging. And now some of the enterprising Yankees are talking of furnishing the South with a sheet iron covering for cotton. It is said that a manufacturer has stated that iron could be rolled as thin as paper and in that shape two sheets of suitable size would answer perfectly and would be as cheap and easily applied as jute while the protection afforded is far better. If the iron can be rolled as thin as paper there is probably no doubt of the fact that sheet iron bagging will answer. But we do not believe that it can be rolled as thin as that and yet retain a sufficient solidity of texture. We doubt if it is malleable enough for this purpose. The Scientific American, however, does not seem to share these doubts for it says:

The sheet iron covering for cotton bales, which we have heard considerable about lately, if it proves not to be too expensive, and its weight not objectionable, and one can be used several times, will prove a successful innovation.

Turkeys. A considerable quantity of turkeys, estimated at 200,000, are being raised in the South. The iron covering would materially lessen the risk from fire, keep the cotton clean, and the bales from depletion.

Mr. Haas' Resignation. Mr. Sol Haas' resignation of the position of Traffic Manager of the Associated Railways takes effect November 1st, and there are many rumors and speculations as to who his successor will be. It is a fine position so long as the Associated System holds together. Yesterday's Charleston News and Courier says: Mr. Sol Haas, traffic manager of the Associated Railways of Virginia and the Carolinas, has notified the members of the Association of his intention to resign his position, to become traffic manager of the Newport News and Mississippi Valley Company.

Mr. Haas has managed the traffic business of the three systems under his control with a marked ability and success for the past five or six years, and it will be very hard to fill his place. When he accepted the position the Atlantic Coast Line, the Seaboard Air Line and the Piedmont Air Line, which compose the Associated Railways of Virginia and the Carolinas, were fighting each other like Kilkenny cats, it is said. They are all competing lines, and Mr. Haas deserves great credit for the tact and skill with which he has managed their conflicting interests and in preserving a harmony among them which has redounded to the benefit of all concerned, although it cannot be said that he has especially favored Charleston in the arrangement of rates, &c.

Mr. Haas' resignation does not take effect until November 1, and as the Associated Railways have not yet held a meeting to consider the matter it is impossible to say who his successor will be. The three men most likely to be mentioned in connection with the place are Mr. T. M. Emerson, general freight and passenger agent of the Atlantic Coast Line, Mr. J. H. Drake, general freight agent of the Piedmont Air Line and Mr. R. D. Carpenter. The last named gentleman is now assistant traffic manager of the Associated Railways, having been appointed to the position when the Richmond and Danville syndicate absorbed the Atlanta and Charlotte Air Line, of which he was general freight agent.

It is impossible to say, however, who will get the position. It is even within the probabilities that the Association will be broken up and the position abolished, as the Seaboard Air Line people are building connections which will make them independent in a great measure of the Richmond and Danville lines, the Georgia, Carolina and Northern Railroad, which is to give them through connection with Atlanta, having already been completed from Monroe, N. C., to Chesler in this State. Under these conditions the next meeting of the Associated Railways will be watched with a great deal of interest.

At Quarantine. Some little excitement was caused here to-day by the rumor that a schooner direct from Jacksonville was in below, bound up. The vessel is the schooner Milford, Capt. Haskell, and she arrived in the river last Wednesday, August 30th. She is not from Jacksonville but from Perth Amboy, is loaded with railroad iron and has a clean bill of health, so it is said. There is no fever on her and all the excitement has been caused by the fact that Doctors Wood and Thomas went down this morning on the Marie to make a critical inspection of her in company with Dr. W. G. Curtis, Quarantine Physician. Mayor Fowler telegraphed as follows this forenoon to Dr. Curtis:

I protest against the vessel from Florida being admitted to city. Under no circumstances will I acquiesce in her coming to city.

In reply to this the Mayor soon after received the following from Dr. W. G. Curtis:

The Quarantine Board are performing the duties imposed on them by law. That duty is the protection of Wilmington. Let there be no alarm.

And there need be none. The Milford left Jacksonville July 17th. She went there with a cargo of ice and then took on lumber and on the above date she sailed for Perth Amboy. She there discharged the lumber and took on a cargo of railroad iron and sailed for this port, arriving in below last Wednesday, on which date she was reported as arrived in the REVIEW. She is consigned here to Messrs. E. G. Barker & Co. and as she wanted to come up to the city the Quarantine Board were called upon to visit and inspect her. From all that we can understand there is nothing against her except the fact that she was in Jacksonville last July. The physicians are expected to return to the city to-night and will then, we presume, visit her report.

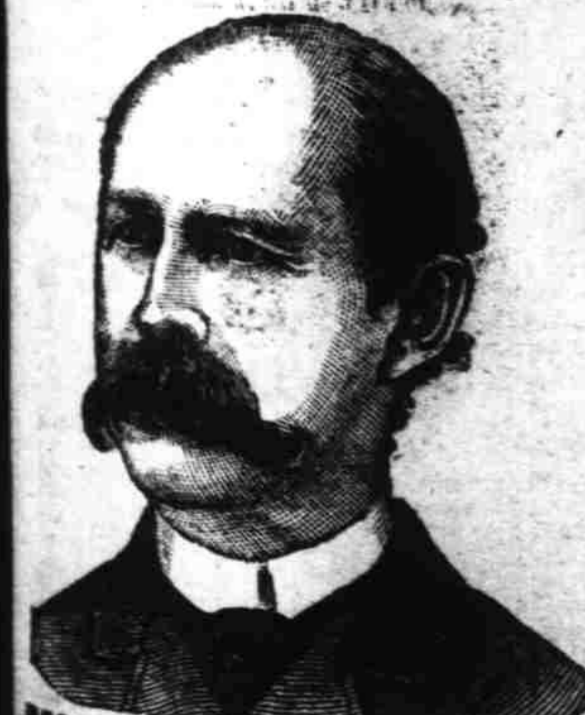
