Death of Mr. John L. Holmes.

We deeply regret to learn of the sudden and tragic death of Mr. John L. Holmes, formerly a well-known resident of this city, which occurred in the mountains in the Western part of this State, near Saluda. He was killed by being thrown from a carriage, during a runaway of the team, while driving from the summer residence of the family, Macaboy, Polk county, to Saluda. It is not known yet whether the accident occurred yesterday or to-day but it is inferred that it must have taken place this morning. The only information received here thus far is contained in a telegram from Mr. J. Dobbin Holmes to Mr. Gabriel Holmes. He says that his father was killed instantly and that his sister, Miss Sallie, was slightly hurt. No one else was injured. Mr. Dobbin Holmes also says in his telegram that he will leave Saluda to-morrow for this city, with the remains. The funeral will therefore probably take place Thursday morning.

Mr. Holmes was, we think, about 68 years of age. He was a life-long resident of Wilmington, up to about eight years ago, when he removed with his family to Jacksonville where he has since resided, engaged in the practice of his profession, that of the law. Last Spring he purchased a summer residence at Macaboy, where the family have remained during the summer months. But the hand of affliction has been laid upon them sorely since they left Wilmington, as three of the children died in Jacksonville.

Mr. Holmes was an honorable, high-minded gentleman, a good citizen, a fond husband and an indulgent father and a sincere, conscientious Christian, one who tried most earnestly to understand his duty and understanding to perform it. For many years, and until his removal to Jacksonville, he was a vestryman of St. John's Church. He had made many warm friends in his new home, where he was succeeding well in the practice of his profession and the sad news of his death will carry deep grief to many sorrowing friends there as well as here.

Criminal Court.

The following cases were called and disposed of in this court to-day: State vs. Mary A. Barnes, larceny. Judgment suspended.

Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance met in regular session yesterday afternoon. Present, Mr. R. J. Jones, chairman, and Messrs. W. I. Gore, J. F. Maundar, and Jno W. Hewitt. Report of the committee on Streets and Wharves on paving North Front street was approved. The following resolution was offered by the chairman:

WHEREAS, A tax of \$2.00 on the \$100 of valuation of the real and personal property of the citizens was levied for the year 1888, and in said levy twenty-five cents, on the \$100 of valuation was included for the purpose of paying the interest on the city's subscription to the stock of the Wilmington, Onslow and East Carolina railroad and the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley railroad, and it now appears that such interest will not be required to be paid during the current year; therefore,

It is hereby recommended to the Board of Aldermen that the city levy for the current year be reduced one eighth, making the tax levy the same as that of last year.

It is hereby ordered that the clerk of this Board be instructed to hand a copy of these proceedings to the Mayor with the request that he call a meeting of the Board of Aldermen to consider the matter.

Mr. Jones hoped that the matter would meet with the approval of the Board. He thought it due to the tax payers to relieve them of the payment of this unnecessary tax; the bonds have not yet been issued, and it is a question if the tax could be collected, if any one was disposed to fight it.

On Mr. Gore's motion, the resolution was adopted, unanimously. The ordinance levying a tax of \$25 per month on "ticket scalpers," as adopted by the Board of Aldermen, was laid before the Board.

Mr. Gore thought it too heavy a tax to impose. Mr. H. H. Kasprowiez, a ticket broker, was present and was accorded a hearing. He said the railroad companies wanted to stamp out the business entirely. It was a legitimate business; but it did not amount to more than fifty dollars a month, and the profits were not more than \$10 or \$15 per month. He thought a reasonable tax would be \$50 a year—the same as paid in Charleston, S. C.

The chairman said the Board was not sufficiently informed about the matter; there were two sides to the question. He suggested that consideration of the ordinance be deferred until the next regular meeting, and it was so ordered.

Bills for current expenses amounting to \$525.55 were then audited and approved, and the Board adjourned.
