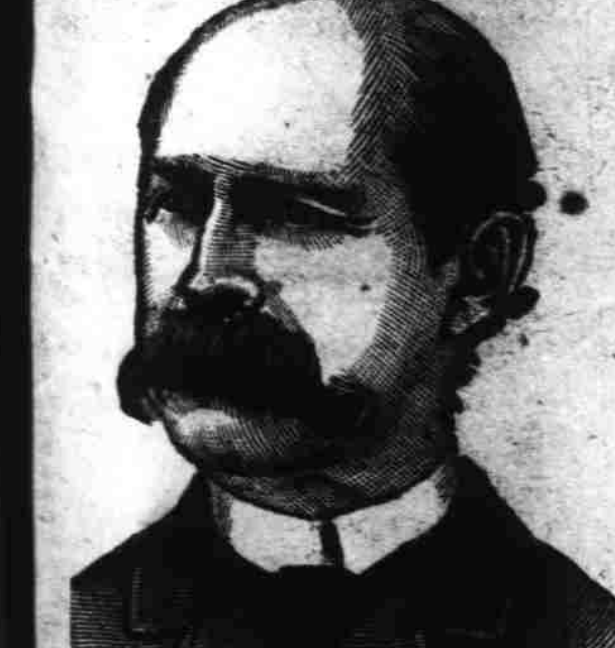

Board of Aldermen.

The Board met in special session yesterday afternoon at the call of the Mayor.

The Mayor stated the object of the meeting—to consider the recommendation of the Board of Audit and Finance that the tax levy for the current year be reduced one-eighth, making the levy the same as last year.

On motion of Alderman King, seconded by Alderman Pearsall, the recommendation of the Board of Audit and Finance in the matter was adopted. With the approval of the Board, the Mayor said the City Clerk and Treasurer would be directed to remit the over-plus of tax.

Alderman King offered the following as an amendment, which after brief discussion as to its necessity, was adopted:

Resolved, That in Class One of the Tax Ordinance, section 2 and 3, relative to real, personal and poll for the year 1888, the tax be reduced one-eighth or 12 1/2 per cent. on the levy, so that the whole be \$1.75 on the \$100, and on line 17, after "1888," strike out the words, "and for debts of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad Co. and the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina Railroad."

A petition from J. W. Taylor for permission to erect a wooden frame building with metal roof on Second, between Mulberry and Walnut streets, was granted.

Alderman Ricaud, from the Committee on Markets, said that some of the butchers of the city were present and desired to be heard in regard to the renting of stalls in the market houses, and on motion they were granted a hearing.

Mr. John F. Garrell explained the situation. The butchers were under the impression that they would be allowed to retain their stalls at the present rental if they desired, but a change had been made by the Market Committee at the instance of an outside party who had said he intended to come in and run the rent of stalls up to a higher figure than they could stand. The butchers did not want a monopoly, but thought they were entitled to protection.

Mr. Cutler, city attorney, said that he would like to explain. Mr. Garrell had referred to a disagreement between the butchers and Mr. Rhodes. He said that he had been told that no man could bring cattle here and sell to one butcher without the approval of the others; Mr. Rhodes had a drove of cattle to sell and could not find a purchaser because of this combination.

Mr. Garrell denied the statement of Mr. Rhodes, and Mr. Melton said that there was an association of butchers to control the purchase of beef cattle. Mr. Jones also denied that there was any agreement to control prices, and said that if one butcher needed cattle more than another he would pay more for them.

Alderman Ricaud gave the reasons for the action of the committee in the matter. Mr. Rhodes came to him and said that he would agree to give \$400 per annum for stall No. 1 in Front street market, that rents for \$15 per month, and that he told Mr. Rhodes that if he would make a deposit of \$150 as a guarantee or forfeit, he (Mr. Ricaud) would call the committee together to consider the matter. This was done, and the committee considering that if no more rent could be obtained for the stalls, they as custodians of the interests of the city, had no right to do otherwise than rent them to the highest bidder and changed their plans.

Alderman Dudley objected. He did not see why the butchers should be disturbed in their business. They ought to be protected from outsiders. So far as the market house paying was concerned, it never would pay. He would challenge the committee to show that the markets had not paid more the first year they were rented than any year since. He moved that the Market Committee be instructed as rent the stalls at the same price to last year.

After further debate a vote was taken on Alderman Dudley's motion, and it was defeated. Yeas—Alderman Dudley, Walker, Sampson—3; nays—Alderman Pearsall, Ricaud, King, Rice—4.

There being no other business, on motion the meeting adjourned.

A complimentary excursion to a number of business men and employees will be given by the New Hanover Transit Company, on the *Sylvan Grove*, to the Carolina Beach to-morrow afternoon. We understand that, in consequence of this fact, a half holiday will be given on the wharf to-morrow.

Our Public Building.

Through a letter received by Col. B. R. Moore from Hon. Alfred Rowland we learn that the appropriation for the public building in this city, as the matter now stands, amounts to the sum of \$150,000, and that this sum will be available on October 1st next. Col. Rowland thinks that the building will be commenced as soon thereafter as bids for material, &c., can be received and contracts for the same can be made.

Dry Grins Abound.

The challenge race at Wrightsville on Monday last, spoken of in the REVIEW, between the *Idler*, the *Peggoty* and the *Pirate*, was won by the latter. "He laughs best who laughs last" and those who have been smiling at the ungainly aspect of the *Pirate* have suddenly been afflicted with an attack of dry grins. The *Pirate* won the race and Mr. Giles, her owner and sailer, claims that she beat twice in the same race. She was ahead of the other two boats when she dropped a man overboard, and stopped to pick him up. The pecking up of the man was of small consequence when compared with the momentous question of victory or defeat, but as the rules of the Club require that a boat must carry through the race all of the ballast she starts out with, Mr. Giles very considerably and humanely put about and picked up the man. In the meantime the *Idler* had overhauled and passed her but the *Pirate* slipped in to windward and soon drew ahead again. There were not many to witness the race but those who saw it say that it was one of the most interesting and exciting yachting events of the season. The boats were all handled superbly. Mr. Norwood Giles sailed the *Pirate*, Mr. Pembroke Jones the *Idler*, and Capt. Jos. Price the *Peggoty*. The latter was at one time leading the *Idler* when unfortunately her centreboard "fouled a shoal" and the *Idler* passed her before she got clear. The *Pirate* made the course in 1 hour, 28 minutes and 30 seconds.

Citizens' Building and Loan Association.

There was a large number of the stockholders of the Citizens' Building and Loan Association last night at the City Court room, for the purpose of electing directors for the ensuing year.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. W. H. Chadbourne, the president, after which the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The annual report of the Association was then read, and showed that the business of the organization was in a most flourishing condition, each share having made a net earning of 10 per cent. during the fiscal year.

Upon motion, Messrs. W. A. Riach and Jas. T. Biley were appointed to verify proxies. One thousand and twenty-seven shares were found represented, being a majority of the stock, and then upon motion the Secretary was ordered to cast the unanimous vote for the old Board of Directors: W. H. Chadbourne, W. A. Riach, W. F. Williams, H. G. Smallbones, J. H. Sharp, J. W. Jackson, E. G. Barker, G. M. Altamer, John McEntee, M. Bellamy, A. G. Hankins, E. F. Johnson, T. J. Pratt.

It was also moved and carried unanimously that a vote of thanks be returned to the officers of the Association for the admirable manner in which they had conducted the business of the Association during the past year.

The stockholders-meeting then adjourned and the Board of Directors met and the following officers were re-elected unanimously: W. H. Chadbourne, President; H. G. Smallbones, Vice President; James T. Biley, Secretary and Treasurer. Attorneys—M. Bellamy and A. G. Ricaud.

The meeting then adjourned.

In the Criminal Court to-day Col. B. R. Moore, the Solicitor, announced the death of Mr. John L. Holmes, formerly a practitioner at this Bar. The announcement was made in feeling and appropriate terms and it is probable that a meeting of the Bar will be called some day this week for the purpose of offering a tribute to the memory of the deceased.
