A Christian Soldier's Death.
The sad news was received here by telegraph to-day of the death at McClellny, Florida, on yesterday, of Rev. Charles S. Snowden. He died literally in harness and at the post of duty. His death was the fitting close of a noble, self-sacrificing life. It was upon the field of battle and in the thickest of the strife. He was not unready for the summons. He has gone to brighter scenes than this and his reward in the next world is as sure and steadfast as was his faith and his works in this. But ah! for those who are left here—his near ones and his dear ones—to mourn the death of this brave, true-hearted, faithful Christian soldier! To them it is a cup full of bitterness and sorrow but to him it is all bright and beautiful now, a rest from his labor—no, not exactly that, for all of his life here was a labor of love and a love of labor—but it is simply a glorified fruition of the seeds of mercy and charity and self-sacrifice sown in this world. His epitaph was uttered nearly two thousand years before his birth, and by the Great Captain of his salvation. It is this: Greater love hath no man than this; that a man lay down his life for his friends.

Only a Few Remarks.

The last act is "entirely Japanese" and the costumes displayed rendered it particularly beautiful. The part of the principal character, "Violet," was taken by Miss Annie DeRosset, whose delightful voice and charming personation caused her every appearance to be greeted with rounds of applause. Her rendition of the song, "The Moon and I," was rapturously received and was repeatedly encored. Miss Schwarz, in the role of "Dolly Dimple," rendered the character most charmingly. "Miss Hurricane," by Miss Cameron, was delightfully given. The character of "Gen. Kniekerbocker" was admirably presented by Mr. Boatwright and Mr. Emerson, in the double role of "Alvin Barry" and "the great Tycoon," rendered both parts very effectively. The duet between Miss DeRosset and Mr. Emerson received as it deserved a perfect storm of applause. Mr. Robinson, as "Rufus Ready," carried out his part exceedingly well. The following is submitted by Dr. Wood:

EDITOR REVIEW:—Dear Sir:—At the request of the North Carolina Board of Health, Dr. Wm. J. Love visited the patient reported to Surgeon-General Hamilton as a probable case of yellow fever. He found him ten miles from Burgaw, in an insalubrious locality, recovering from what is known as hemorrhagic malarial fever. He had been nowhere in an infected region.
