
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

It Was Not Yellow Fever.

A few days ago Dr. Walter C. Murphy telegraphed to Raleigh that he had discovered a genuine case of yellow fever near Burgaw. This of course excited much interest and some feeling and an official investigation of the fact has shown that Dr. Murphy was in error and that it was not a case of yellow fever. The following is submitted by Dr. Wood:

WILMINGTON, Sept. 20, 1888.) EDITOR REVIEW:-Dear Sir:-At the request of the North Carolina Board of Health, Dr. Wm. J. Love visited the patient reported to Surgeon-General Hamilton as a probaole case of yellow fever. He found him ten miles from Burgaw, in an insalubrious locality, recovering from
