

Yesterday's New York Herald devotes over three columns to its reports of the yellow fever epidemic. It seems to be rapidly making its way towards the Mississippi. Nothing but a freeze will check it.

Mr. Robert Haydn, of the Charlotte Chronicle, thinks there is no doubt of Senator Ransom's election. He said recently to a reporter for the Washington (D. C.) Post:

"I can tell you that nothing in the world can beat Senator Ransom. He is as good as elected. Four-fifths of the stockholders of the paper have expressed themselves as friendly to Senator Ransom, and between the two Senators, Ransom and Vance, I don't know of any antagonism."

Congressman Charles Tracey, who has been on a visit to his home in Albany, N. Y., and who has just returned to Washington City, said this to a New York Star correspondent:

"The political situation in and around Albany was never more promising for the Democracy. There are no divisions, there is a perfect organization, and the enthusiasm is something positively enjoyable. I talked with a number of the local leaders, and but one report reached my ears. It is a Democratic year in New York beyond question."

"It is not true, then that Democrats are going over to the Republicans?"  
"Not by any means. On the contrary, the boot is on the other leg. Many Republicans are coming over to us. Governor Hill has inaugurated his canvass in a most successful manner, and no utterance of his awakened a heartier indorsement than his emphatic declaration that he does not desire a divided triumph. Everything, indeed, is working most harmoniously, and the situation cannot, in my opinion, be changed."

The rogues in New York are no sardines. They don't do the thing by halves. The latest is the exposure of one of Ferdinand Ward's disciples, one James E. Bedell, who gathered together over \$250,000 belonging to other people. He didn't get to Canada, though, but was arrested and is now in the Tombs. The New York Star says:

One of the most gigantic swindles that has been brought to the notice of the police for years was unearthed last Monday morning when it was found that James E. Bedell, the trusted manager of the mortgage and loan department of Shipman, Barlow, Larocque and Choate's extensive law business, at No. 35 William street, was an embezzler to the extent of \$264,500.

Not content with the salary of \$7,500 a year, he concocted a scheme of preparing false mortgages, and by peculiar negotiations systematically conducted managed not only to rob his firm, but through them and their good credit swindled the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company out of more than half this amount.  
The methods of his speculations were as peculiar as they were ingenious, and by careful and diligent scheming he has for four years conducted one of the most successful systems of robbery that has been known for years.

The Goose Problem.  
EDITOR REVIEW:—I submit you my answer to "Bertha":

Two farmers go to market with 30 geese each; one sells his at 2 for \$1, receiving \$15; the other 3 for \$1, receiving \$10; total \$25, or an average of 41 2/3 cents apiece. The next day they start to market with 30 geese each, but one being taken sick turns his 30 geese over to the other, who goes to the same party they had both sold to on the day previous; he offered him at the rate of 5 for \$2, or an average of 40 cents apiece, which makes a difference of 1 2/3 cents in the average, which makes \$1 difference in the whole or respectively \$25 and \$24.

EDITOR REVIEW:—The same goose problem "Bertha" had inserted in yesterday's REVIEW, and which she asks me to solve and explain, I found inserted a couple of weeks ago in the Orphan's Friend and Hartford Insurance Advocate. These papers had copied it from the Atlanta Constitution, all under the heading "Do Figures Lie?" I solved the problem already then for my own satisfaction, but did not report the explanation or solution. As you call now on me particularly to explain this problem at length, I am at your service and do so with pleasure.

First day's sales: A. sold one coop geese, 30 head, at 2 for \$1—\$15; and B. sold one coop geese, 30 head, at 3 for \$1—\$10. Total \$25.

Second day's sales: A. and B. sold two coops geese, 60 head, at 5 for \$2—\$24, and you ask what causes the difference in the receipts from sales of \$1, from first day and second day and I will explain, viz:

The merchant that buys the geese the second day and these geese having been sold at the same prices like first day can only claim, according to contract, out of the geese coops on the second day, 10 times 2 geese out of A's coop—20, and 10 times 3 geese out of B's coop—30, (and these 30 geese of B's is all of the cheap lot) altogether 50 geese at the price merchant paid second day, 5 for \$2, and paid for same 50 geese—\$20. The remainder of 10 geese left in A's coop should bring the same price as the A lot on the first day's sale, viz: 2 for \$1—\$5; total \$25—but this remainder of 10 geese of the A lot merchant also got the second day at the average price of 40 cents each (or 5 for \$2) thereby causing a loss of 10 cents per head on these 10 geese, equal to \$1, to the seller A.
