IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

WASHINGTON, October 5.—Senate not in session.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Several private bills having been disposed of in Committee of the Whole, Mr. McRae, of Arkansas, called up the Senate bill to incorporate the Maritime Canal Company of Nicaragua, and the measure was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Culbertson, of Texas, offered an amendment providing that nothing in this act shall be held or construed in any manner to involve the United States in any pecuniary obligation whatever other than in respect to the payment of tolls.

Mr. Culbertson's amendment was agreed to, and the bill being in Committee of the Whole the question was put on reporting the bill favorably to the House. The vote resulted 33 to 6, and Mr. Fuller made the point of no quorum. The committee then rose.

Mr. Burns offered a concurrent resolution, which was agreed to, for the appointment of a select joint committee of three Senators and three Representatives to investigate the work done on the Washington aqueduct tunnel, contracts made for the same, the bidding for and letting of contracts, and the compensation paid for the work.

The House then at 5 o'clock took a recess until 8 o'clock, the evening session to be for consideration of private pension bills.

Quite a number of the students are subjects of the revival.

Rutherfordton Banner: As Mr. B. A. Hampton was returning from the Democratic Club meeting on Friday night last he was set upon, on the outskirts of town, by four or five men and severely beaten with rocks. His clothing was cut in several places, and a pocketbook containing something over \$100 was either lost in the melee or stolen by his assailants. Mr. Hampton made as good a defense as possible under the circumstances but the odds were too heavily against him. He was unable to identify the parties, but thinks they were all white men. The assault was brutal and cowardly in the extreme.
