During the eight months ending with August there came to the Unitell States nearly 400,000 immigrants, (392,937,) or about 30,000 more than in the first eight months of last year. It is worth noting that while England and Wales sent us 2,000 less than last year and Ireland only 700 more, Scotland sent 2,100 more. The Germans were slightly less, but in all other nationalities there was an increase. Of the total immigration for the eight months every 100 was made up substantially as follows: British, 31; German, 19; Bohemian, Austrian, Hungarian, Polish and Russian, 18; Scandinavian, 15; Italian, 10, and other countries, 7 Of the British immigrants 43 per cent. were Irish, 42 per cent. English and Welsh, and 15 per cent-Scotch. During the eight months the most remarkably increase was LIFE, the grea in the Russian, Hungarian and Polish, which reached 75,000, an advance of 17,500 over last year.

One thing is pretty definitely known already, and that is that the source of the yellow fever infection for this country is almost invariably the ports of Cuba. If it is to be effectually suppressed means must be found for clearing that island of its presence, and that would involve a complete regeneration of the sanitary condition of its ports, which are never entirely free from the infection. This would be extremely difficult to accomplish. In the meantime our only defence is an effective national quarantine against the ports from which yellow fever is liable to be brought. Immunity for a series of years always induces carelessness in inspection until the infection gets in where it might have been prevented.


