IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

**SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, October 17.—The Senate resumed consideration of the tariff bill, and was addressed by Mr. Teller.

At the close of Mr. Teller's speech Mr. Allison offered a concurrent resolution for a recess of Congress from Saturday next to the 19th of November.

The resolution went over till tomorrow. Mr. Morgan then proceeded to address the Senate on the Tariff Bill. He referred to Mr. Allison's recess resolution as a piece of *finesse* to cover the death of the bill.

Without action on the bill the Senate adjourned.

**HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.**  
The speaker laid before the House twelve pension veto messages, which were referred to the Committee on Invalid Pensions.

Mr. Cox, of New York, rising to a question of privilege, sent to the clerk's desk and had read an editorial from the New York *Tribune* of 29th ultimo, entitled "S. S. Cox's Postal Fraud," charging him with sending unfrankable matter through the mails under his frank. Mr. Cox said he had seen the alleged fraud upon which the *Tribune's* editorial was based, and it was a forgery. He had set on foot an investigation as to where the forgery originated.

Mr. Kilgore, of Texas, offered a resolution providing for the final adjournment on the 25th inst.

Mr. Richardson, of Tennessee, moved its reference to the Ways and Means Committee. Agreed to.

Goldsboro *Argus*: Mr. Thos. S. Sutton, of Sampson county, has a common field pea vine that measures eighteen feet across.

Newbern *Journal*: Sportsmen are out hunting nearly every day and seldom fail to bring back quantities of wild game and in great variety. A gentleman living in the city has recently gone on three hunting expeditions and killed four deer, smaller game, geese, duck, quail, squirrel, etc., are in market nearly every day.

Asheville *Citizen*: Mr. George A. Shuford has returned from a visit to Macon, Clay and Cherokee. His own observations and the opinions of competent observers assure him of brilliant Democratic success. The best of feeling prevails everywhere. Mr. Johnston is gaining, rather than losing, as his opponents fondly claim; and he will succeed himself by a largely increased majority.

Durham *Plant*: This morning as the wife of Dolphus Fuller, who works in the "long cut" department of Blackwell's Durham Tobacco Co., was about her morning duties, wearing a bustle of goodly proportion, passed near an open fireplace, when the bustle, holding the skirt of her dress way out behind, held it over the blazing fire. Before she was aware of it she was all aflame, and in all probability is fatally burned.

Winston *Daily*: To give some faint idea of the ephemeral growth of this section: A little over 17 years ago the people of this county voted \$100,000 for the construction of a railroad from Greensboro to this point. The road was built and in less than ten years the last dollar of this debt was paid, while her taxable property in the meantime had increased from \$2,107,140 to \$5,212,775—nearly a double what it was.

Laurensburg *Exchange*: On the first Sabbath in November the new pastor of the Presbyterian Church here will be formally installed. Rev. Dr. H. G. Hill, of Maxton, will preach the installation sermon, Rev. A. L. Phillips, of Fayetteville, will deliver the charge to the pastor and Rev. A. N. Ferguson will deliver the charge to the people. —Mr. Cam Wright requests us to say that he is a first cousin of the deceased John W. Sneed and that he hurls back into Dockery's face a challenge for a comparison of his own ancestors with those of the dead man, whom
