At the late meeting of the Institution of Naval Architects at Glasgow, Mr. B. Martell, the chief surveyor, Lloyd's Registry, gave some very interesting results of his researches on the comparative merits of deep keel and centreboard yachts for racing purposes. He gives the preference to the latter. He says: "It would appear that the American type of yacht possesses greater stiffness, and, therefore, greater sail-carrying power; it has, by reason of the centreboard, greater resistance to leeway, is fitted with better sails for close hauled sailing, and has practically more skin friction and wave-making resistance at all ordinary speeds, while the only point on which the British type has the advantage is that she is safer in bad weather on the open sea with a large spread of canvas."

The expectation that the proposed connection between the observatories of Paris and Greenwich will lead to the acceptance of the Greenwich meridian by the French may be premature, but, says the New York Times, the step itself would be very sensible. The advantages in the selection of a single prime meridian for all the world were fully set forth in the proceedings of the well known international conference held in this country a few years ago. And, while the French delegates were among the few who strongly dissented from the general conclusion, yet the weight of opinion was heavily against them. In such a matter national pride is properly sacrificed to scientific benefit and maritime convenience. Should it be once conceded that a common prime meridian should be taken for all nations, the claims of Greenwich would be apparent, not only on account of the large commercial maritime and widely extended territorial interests of Great Britain, but also and chiefly because of the large proportion of existing maps and charts reckoning from that meridian. Facts put before the conference showed in how many cases longitude from Greenwich was given, in addition to the longitude from some local prime meridian, used nowhere except in the country of its origin.

The hostility of the Emperor Frederick to the Anti-Semitic movement in Germany is strikingly expressed in an utterance recorded in the reminiscences published by Prof. Delbruck, who long held the position of tutor in the household of the deceased monarch. "The Anti-Semitic movement," writes Delbruck, "had gained firm ground in Berlin, and the Crown Prince summoned to his presence one of his former secretaries, Herr Max Duncker, in order to learn his views with regard to the agitation. 'It is madness,' was the historian's laconic answer. The Prince declared that to him this expression was not sufficiently condemnatory; he regarded the matter as much more serious. Not alone that the Court preacher compromised all Germany, and especially Berlin, but his assaults upon the Jews were a sin, not only against humanity, but against Christianity. He should like to see that Jew who would now think of becoming a Christian when every day outrages are committed against his race in the name of the Christian religion."

The opening weeks of the Paris Parliamentary session are likely to be chiefly occupied by two burning questions. The first is the proposed reform or "revision" of the Constitution. The second is the decree with regard to foreign residents in France. A kind of revision epidemic has set in among the French Deputies. Five or six rival schemes had already been submitted to the Chamber and rejected, or handed over to the circumlocution committee for examination, before M. Floquet introduced his plan. Of all the schemes the most sensational was Gen. Boulanger's. A dozen other projects, visionary and revisionary, have been devised during the recess. All aim at a change of the Constitution, and that is about the only point in which they resemble each other. The Red Radical schemes propose the abolition of the President and Senate. The Boulangist ideal of government is a convention, with irresponsible ministers and a virtual dictator. What the Comte de Paris's followers mean by "revision" has not been clearly explained—in public—and, as M. Magnard has repeatedly pointed out in the *Figaro*, their uncanid attitude is disconcerting old-fashioned Royalists. As a first step to their secret end—which, it may be assumed, is the substitution of the Comte de Paris for M. Carnot—they seem willing to accept a military dictatorship.
