

> Against the Law to Bet and Treat. The laws of North Carolina do not

permit betting on elections, and every time a man makes a bet he lays himself liable to punishment The law on the subject is found in section 2717 of the Election Law, and says: "Any person who shall bet or wager any money or other thing of value upon any election held in this State shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

It is also against the law to handle the ardent on election day. Section 2714 says: "Any person who shall treat with either meat or drink on any day of election, or on any day previous thereto, with an intent






