The Cincinnati Centennial Exposition, which was a success in the matter of display and attendance and which closed on last Saturday night, owes \$330,000. At the outset, the commissioners borrowed \$280, 060 from the banks, giving them \$1, 050,000 in guarantee notes as collateral security. "It is estimated," says the Cincinnati Enquirer, "that one-fifth of the guarantee notes are Brown (sadly): "Multiplication, practically worthless. 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
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
