STATE NEWS.

Clinton Caucasian: The ladies of this township are Democrats of the first water. They are refusing to recognize any of the young men who so far forgot themselves and what they owe to society in the late election as to vote the Radical ticket.

Shelby Aurora: Cleveland County Democracy did valiantly and made Democratic gains. The majority is 1895, yet Catawba still holds the banner with 1895 majority. Cleveland gained while Catawba did not do as well. Number one township did the best in Cleveland county and her Democratic gains entitle her to the silk banner donated by Col. W. H. H. Cowles.

Durham Plant: Mr. W. T. Dixon and Miss Della Rollins, daughter of Mr. W. P. Rollins, were married last evening, at the home of the bride, Rev. Dr. E. A. Yates officiating. At the residence of the bride's father yesterday evening, Mr. John N. Gorman and Miss Dora, only daughter of B. W. Matthews, Esq., were united in marriage. Rev. Dr. E. A. Yates officiating.

Fayetteville Observer: There was one thing that we were glad to see on Monday, the day before the election, and that was several colored persons openly and boldly declaring that they intended to vote the Democratic ticket, and they stood firm, fully one hundred or more voted, if not for all, for the majority of the Democratic ticket, and it is to their aid that we are indebted for the increased vote.

Laurinburg Exchange: Be it said to the credit of about twenty-five negroes in Laurel Hill township that they voted for Major Wooten last week, and we hope this step will teach them the wisdom of voting for more Democrats. — Rev. John Monroe, commonly known as Father Monroe, had been pastor of Providence and Spring Hill Baptist churches in this county for 60 years, when he voluntarily gave them up. This is the longest unbroken pastoral supervision of any church yet heard of.

Asheville Citizen: A very sad and sudden death occurred on the west-bound train yesterday morning, just this side of Old Fort. The deceased was Rev. Joseph Builder, of Toronto, Ontario, who was en route to Asheville, to spend the winter in search of health. The deceased was accompanied on his trip by his wife, and it was their intention to spend several months in Asheville and Western North Carolina. But fate decreed otherwise. Mr. Builder died of heart disease, and was aged about 40 years.

Newton Enterprise: Merchants tell us that farmers are in better condition financially this fall than they have been for several years. They have money in their pockets, are trading freely and are taking up the old notes that are held against them. — Farmers have about finished their wheat sowing, and the long Indian summer that has just terminated has given the seed a good chance to come up and take root before the setting in of hard freezes. Some fields look quite green already. The acreage is perhaps the largest ever sown in the county.

Charlotte Chronicle: Mr. Will Parsons, a druggist of Wadesboro, was married in that town last Wednesday afternoon, to Miss Rosa Leak. Rev. C. C. Quin, pastor of the Episcopal church at that place, performed the ceremony. — Mr. Lyman Stanford, a respected and aged citizen of Paw Creek township, this county, died at his home at 8 o'clock on the night of the 14th. Mr. Stanford leaves fourteen living children, of whom eight daughters and four sons were at his bedside at the time of his death. — One of the longest trains of cars ever seen in Charlotte was hauled around town by the R. & D. shifting engine, yesterday. The train consisted of 65 box cars and one flat car, but none of the cars were loaded. While the engine was at the depot in town, the tail end of the train was out in the country. A dozen brakemen were on top of the cars to pass signals to the engineer.

Lincolnton Courier: Some of the oldest voters in the county went up to the polls at Reidsville on last Tuesday a week ago and cast their ballots for the Democratic party. The names of these worthy old men are: Max Warlick, 83 years old, Jacob Michal, 89 years, and Joseph Stany, 84 years. Mr. Warlick's first vote was cast for John Q. Adams in 1823. — While Mr. Jno. Propst, of Catawba county, was drilling wheat, about a week ago in his field, his horse became frightened and ran away, throwing him from his seat. His face was horribly mangled. The skin was torn from one cheek bone to the other and his nose was torn loose between the eyes so that it was found necessary to insert tubes in replacing the parts torn loose. Mr. Propst's right shoulder was also dislocated. At last accounts he was getting on very well and it is thought that he will recover.

Statesville Landmark: Our people were never so much depressed by defeat in the national election as they are at this time. Old soldiers compare their sensations to those experienced at the surrender, and some declare they did not feel as bad at Appomattox as they felt last week. The most painful disappointment, however, is that of the old people, for many of them do not expect now to live to see another Democratic President. — J. O. Hoots killed Charlie Byrd in Wilkes county last Friday evening. The story of the affair which reaches here is that Byrd went to Hoots' store and began abusing him. Hoots begged him to leave and got him off the porch. Byrd got on his horse, still cursing Hoots and daring him out, the latter telling him he wanted no fuss. Byrd got off his horse and jumped on the porch exclaiming, "I can whip hell out of you," at the same time running his hand in his pocket and advancing on Hoots. Hoots struck him with a piece of plank and Byrd died in 28 hours. The slayer was held in a bond of \$1,000 for his appearance at court.

Raleigh News and Observer: Yesterday morning two negroes, John Hawkins and Rufus Moore, who were engaged at the new store on Fayetteville street belonging to Maj. R. S. Tucker, scraping the walls preparatory to papering them, had a difficulty which resulted in Moore's carving up the phiz of Hawkins after a very scientific manner with a knife. Moore was working under Hawkins and had been discharged by him, in consequence of which the difficulty occurred. One of Hawkins' cheeks was nearly slashed off and he got several other severe gashes about the face. Moore made his escape and has not been captured. He went off on the morning train for Weldon. — The Supreme Court of North Carolina has decided the case of Cross and White against the defendants. On the first Monday in December the opinion will be certified down to the Clerk of the Superior Court of Wake. On receiving the certified opinion of the Supreme Court the Clerk will notify the Sheriff who will then take the defendants in custody and, nothing else appearing, place them in imprisonment. The decision of the Supreme Court of North Carolina determined finally all questions raised by the appeal of the defendants except the question of jurisdiction. The defendants claiming that to be a Federal question will at once endeavor to obtain a writ of error from the Supreme Court of North Carolina.
