The country has heard so much of Indiana and her favorite sons in a political way for twenty years past that it may be just as well to remark that this is the first time the State ever gave the country a President. Virginia gave us Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe and John Tyler. Massachusetts was the home of John Adams and John Quincy Adams, Tennessee supplied and Andrew Johnson. Zachary Tay-tailor made man!-Exchange. lor was from Louisiana. New York tin Van Buren, Millard Fillmore, Chester A. Arthur and Grover Cieve land. William Henry Harrison came from Ohio, and so did Rutherford B. Hayes and James A. Gar field. The great State of Pennsylvania supplied the country with one President-James Buchanan-New Hampshire another in the person of Franklin Pierce, and Illinois was the State from which Abraham Lin coln and Gen. Grant hailed when they were elected.

The present Legislature of Georgia is remarkable because of the youthfulness of its presiding officers. The President of the Senate, Mr. Fleming du Bignon, and the Speaker of the House, Mr. A. S. Clay, were both born in the year 1853. They were still mere boys while the war was raging, and entered upon their political career af ter the bitterness of the reconstruction era had passed away. The bringing to the front of the young men in the South is becoming very noticeable. Governor Seay, of Alabama, is only 45 years old. Repre sentatives Phelan, of Tennessee, and Simmons, of North Carolina, are two of the youngest men in Congress. The delegates to the St. Louis Convention from Georgia were almost without exception of the new laws which govern the operations of digestion generation, and two of the Presidential electors just chosen in that State have barely attained their majority. West Virginia has been for years noted for the youthfulness of its Governors, Senators and Rep-

Emancipation in Brazilhas knocked down one of the chief props of the monarchy, and resulted in an agitation for the abolition of imperial institutions and the substitution of a republic. The anti-slavery leaders, encouraged by their successes, naturally took up the cry against royalty, and were as naturally assisted by the slave-holders who had lost their property at the hands of the Empire. To meet the storm the reigning sovereign has resorted to all sorts of diplomatic methods, including a liberal granting of titles and honors of various hue.
