Congress met to-day. It is the second session of the 50th Congress. The President's message was sent in. It is a lengthy document and would probably take up more than one entire page of the REVIEW.

A syndicate has offered \$4,400,000 for the fortification wall surrounding Paris and the ground attached to it. The wall cost \$3,700,000. The French War Office has recommended the demolition of the circular wall.

Yesterday's Charleston *News and Courier* has again shown its wonderful enterprise. It publishes a biographical sketch of every member of the Senate and House in the South Carolina Legislature. It covers nearly twenty columns of solid nonpareil type.

The report reaches Washington from Indiana that Senator John P. Jones, of Nevada, is being considered by General Harrison in connection with the treasury portfolio. Those who are nearest to the President-elect say that it is his intention to give the Pacific slope a place in the Cabinet, and the friends of Mr. Jones have presented his name as a gentleman whose appointment would be entirely satisfactory to the Republicans of that region.

The State Board of Canvassers have completed their work. The Raleigh *News and Observer* gives the following as the result of the count, outside of the vote on the constitutional amendment and the new judges, which has already been published:

The State Board of Canvassers yesterday canvassed the returns for State officers and Congressmen, which completed their work.

The vote for Governor stands, Fowle, 147,925; Dockery, 133,475. Fowle's majority is 14,450.

The vote for all the State officers stands as follows:
