

It appears that the next Federal House is going to be Republican by so small a majority if at all that "our friends, the enemy" will have to denythemselves wholly the pleasure of anything in the nature of 'shenanigin." They will have, says the Raleigh News and Observer, to keep their forces strictly in line and constantly in hand to accomplish anything at all. The Democrats will possibly have the power of denying the House a quorum at any time it Fertilizers, Pine Fibre and may suit their own sweet wills to do so and the Republicans will have to govern themselves accordingly.
