The effect of Mrs. Jay Gould's death upon her husband is said to be serious. (George Gould admits that his father is "terribly broken down," and this means something more than the usual expression of bereavement, although Dr. Baldwin, the family physician, says that his condition needs simply rest to enable him to recover his former health. Quite recently George Gould said, in speaking of his father's absolute retirement from business cares: "He has for two years or more been trying to put his affairs in such a shape that he can lay aside business altogether. This, in part, he has succeeded in doing, but his interests are so large that he cannot do so effectually without prejudicing the interests of others. My father would only be too glad to get clear of business, if he could." That Jay Gould's health is very different from what it was two months ago is a fact, and those who know him best think he may not long survive the great grief that has fallen upon him. Probably Mr. Gould was never spoken of on the street in a more kindly tone than at present. Attention has been more than once called to the purity and harmony of his family relations.
The Isthmus will need close watching during the next few months, since a general stopping of work on the canal would leave a great many people idle and angry there. These might be led to riot and insurrection by professional agitators and revolutionists, of whom there is never a lack in Central America; and, in fact, as a railroad official grimly puts it, another revolution is about due in Colombia, as the last one happened nearly four years ago. It is quite possible that as Secretary Whitney's administration of the Navy Department came in with an uprising on the Isthmus which required the landing of our forces there, so it may go out in the same way. A treaty made with New Granada requires our Government to see that travel across the Isthmus is protected. Still, the probability is that trouble will not come for some time yet, as is indicated also by the ordering away of the Trenton from Panama to Samoa, where the situation is more critical. The Mohican, now at Mare Island, is ready for sea, and can take the Trenton's place at Panama, while the Vandalia, and the Iroquois is also under repairs. To the other side of the Isthmus, at Colon, half a dozen vessels could be sent if necessary, including the three fine steel cruisers, Atlanta, Boston and Chicago.

Both the age of King William III. of Holland, who was born nearly seventy two years ago, and his recent attacks of severe illness have caused the political results which might follow his death to be the subject of prolonged study and preparation in other Courts of Europe as well as his own. This has been the more natural since the heir to the throne of the Netherlands is the Princess Wilhelmina, a child only 8 years old, and the Dutch Chamber of Deputies some time ago made an enactment regulating the succession in case of the death of this young Princess. Nevertheless there will be a certain degree of anxiety when the present status is disturbed by the death of the King, which is now thought to be not far distant. The logic of events seems to show that Holland will gravitate in time to Germany. The demise of William III. will carry the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg at once to the elder branch of the House of Nassau, and that will make it, for all practical military purposes, a part of the German Empire. Then as to Holland, under the influence of her mother, who is a German, Princess Wilhelmina is very likely to be married to a Prussian Prince, and even should she die before reaching a marriageable age German control would become paramount, because the crown would then pass to her aunt Sophie, Grand Duchess of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach.
