While the farmers of the North-
west received a greater aggregate
return for their short wheat crop
than for larger yields, the harvest
was badly distributed, and many
are in distress because of a total failure
of the crop. The Legislature of
Minnesota is moving to the relief
of such farmers in a bill appropriating
\$100,000 for the purchase of seed
wheat. The situation in Dakota in
this respect is much worse.

There is one brilliant member of
the Legislature whose name ought
to go down the sounding ages, em-
bodied in printer's ink. His name
is Reynolds, and he is a member of
the House and he has introduced a
bill to remove the political disabili-
ties of W. W. Holden. This is
something that all of the Reynolds
and all of the legislatures in the
world cannot do. Mr. Holden has
himself acknowledged as much.

It is charged by the Ohio Legisla-
ture that a school book syndicate
has been bleeding the State for some
years, and a committee has been
chosen to investigate the subject.
This committee claims to have dis-
covered that the various firms inter-
ested in school books to Ohio fought
one another so fiercely, previous to
combining, that over \$2,000,000 was
expended in a short time in giving
away books, bribing school commis-
sioners, &c. Then the syndicate or
trust was formed and prices increas-
ed, and it is these prices that the
Legislature proposes to shake off, if
possible.

Excellent Interest Rules.
The following has been handed to
us for publication by a gentleman
in this city, who has carried it with
him as a "pocket piece" for some
time past. It is worthy of being
preserved for ready reference:

The answer in each case being in
cents, separate the two right hand
figures of the answer to express in
dollars and cents.

Four per cent—Multiply the princi-
pal by the number of days to run.
Separate right hand figure from the
product and divide by nine.

Five per cent—Multiply by num-
ber of days and divide by seventy-
two.

Six per cent—Multiply by number
of days, separate right hand figure
and divide by six.

Eight per cent—Multiply by num-
ber of days and divide by forty-five.

Nine per cent—Multiply by num-
ber of days, separate right hand
figure and divide by four.

Ten per cent—Multiply by num-
ber of days and divide by thirty-five.

Twelve per cent—Multiply by
number of days, separate right hand
figure and divide by three.

To find the time in which a sum of
money will double itself at a certain
rate of interest, divide seventy-two
by the rate of interest, and the
result will be the number of years.

For example, at four per cent, money
will double in eighteen years; at
eight per cent it doubles in nine
years. This rule is correct to within
a fraction of a year for all rates
from three per cent upward. We are
indebted for this to Mr. Fackler, the
well known actuary.
