Death of Col. Charles R. Jones.

We are truly sorry to learn of the death of Col. Charles R. Jones, of Charlotte. He died late Saturday afternoon. Col. Jones was at one time proprietor of one of the best newspaper properties in North Carolina but he got the political bee in his bonnet and it stung him to death. He was a kindly, gentle, genial man, the descendant of a revolutionary patriot and himself a good Confederate soldier. Peace to his ashes.

The Snow, the Beautiful Snow.

The beautiful snow this morning was pretty and not disagreeable. It came down very heavily at about 7:30 o'clock but the ground was not frozen and as soon as the sun came out it began to melt and run off. For a while it was a very pretty sight, but there was scarcely enough of it for snowballing. At this writing, 10:30, there is not a vestige of it to be seen, although the house tops were white with it two hours ago. There was no freeze, which is a fortunate thing. If there had been the strawberry crop would have been seriously injured, perhaps ruined.

The Mutual Life.

Charlotte News: We learned yesterday of the promotion of Mr. W. J. Crosswell, the well known route agent of the Southern Express Company, on the Air Line road. He has been promoted to a superintendent's office, with headquarters at Wilmington. This office is not only a much more important one, but pays a better salary, the increase in this respect amounting to \$1,800 per year. Mr. Crosswell is popular with the express men through the South, all of whom will congratulate him upon his promotion.

The chip, chip, chip, of the stone mason's hammer is now heard on the government lot, shaping the stone to be used in the new public building. The cutters arrived here on the Gulf Stream on Saturday from New York, and were hard at work bright and early this morning.

The New Market.

The new market in the Third Ward is soon to be an accomplished fact. Alderman Rieaud, Chairman of the Market Committee, notifies the public that stalls in the lower floor of the Giblem Lodge building, corner Eighth and Princess streets, will be rented at public auction on Wednesday next, the 13th inst., at 12 o'clock.

Death of an Octogenarian.

Aunt Molly Reston, an old and highly esteemed resident of this city, died at her home here early yesterday morning. She was, we think, about 80 years of age. She was the mother of Robert and William Reston, two well known colored men. We knew her well during our earlier years. The interment took place to-day in Pine Forest Cemetery.

Half a Mile of Stone Blocks.

The new block pavement on North Front street, from Chestnut to the depot, is now very nearly completed. Operations have been suspended, temporarily, for the want of the stone blocks. These will be here in a few days and will be at once put down. It is all done now with the exception of a small piece on the West side of the street railway track, at the corner of Walnut street, and the small space between Red Cross street and the bridge. When this is all finished up there will be one continuous stone block pavement all of the way from Orange street to Front street depot, more than seven blocks and in distance more than half a mile.
