Cabinet gossip continues to grow in interest. Since it was rumored that Senator Allison would refuse the Treasury portfolio, a movement was begun to have that position given to ex-Secretary Windom, but it has ended in nothing. It is now said that Col. John C. New can preside over the Treasury if he so desires. Many shrewd politicians say that New, Blaine and Wanaucker are Cabinet certainties. Warner Miller's boom for Secretary of Agriculture is trembling for fear that President Cleveland might withhold his approving signature from the bill.

The Australian ballot system will go into effect in Massachusetts two years hence, and it will then be seen how much the espionage of employers, tolerated under existing election laws, has affected the votes of the workingmen. Under this law no employer or his detective can find out how his men have voted, as the men will go into the polling-booths alone. Each one will check off the names of the candidates from the long roll of the single ballot that he desires to vote for, and he will deposit his ballot folded and unseen by any one. The same law, in effect, was passed by the New York Legislature last winter and vetoed by Governor Hill. It may be passed again, but is not likely to receive the gubernatorial endorsement, and in all probability the first election to be held in this country under a law of this kind will be in Massachusetts. The charges of intimidation and wholesale corruption, which have become so general since the election, may lead to the passage of similar laws in other States.

A political prayer, delivered the other morning in the New York State Senate by the Rev. Dr. S. V. Leech, of the First Methodist Church, of Albany, has created a great sensation. In the course of his prayer Dr. Leech referred to the corruption of elections in great cities and prayed for deliverance from "the political gamblers who buy up the votes of the ignorant immigrants, who comprise such a large proportion of the population of the cities." As soon as the prayer was concluded Senator Grady, white with anger, sprang to his feet with a motion that the officer in charge of the invitation of clergymen to open the proceedings of the Senate with prayer be directed to omit from the invitation for the rest of this session the gentleman who has just assaulted the Throne of Mercy with a very peculiar petition. The country Republican Senators thought the prayer very eloquent and wise, and poked much fun at Senator Grady and his colleagues from the city. The President ruled Senator Grady's motion out of order and in that way shut off a very hot personal debate.

Arab influence in Central Africa is made apparent by the confirmation of the tidings that after M'wanga had been overthrown in Uganda, his successor, Kiwiwa, was disposed of in like summary fashion, because he executed two Arabs who had driven out of the lake region, like those of the coast, see that the time has come for a struggle between their methods—indeed, even their very means of livelihood—and those which the European trade companies are bringing in. Hitherto they have practically controlled the commerce of the interior of Africa and have acquired and held a potent influence over its people. They have terribly misused this power in the slave trade, and now see not only this terrible occupation attacked, but the Germans, the Portuguese, the English, the French and the Italians competing in the race to open trade routes to the interior of the continent. They accept the issue and begin the fight by driving out the missionaries from the interior and declaring war against all the projects of Europeans.
