As soon as the prayer was concluded Senator Grady, white with anger, sprang to his feet with a motion that the officer in charge of the invitation of clergymen to open the proceedings of the Senate with pray er be directed to omlt from the invitation for the rest of this session the gentleman who has just assaulted the Throne of Mercy with a very peculiar petition. The country Republican Senators thought the prayer very eloquent and wise, and poked much fun at Senator Grady and his colleagues from the city. The President ruled Senator Grady's motion out of order and in that way shut off a very hot personal debate.

Arab influence in Central Africa is made apparent by the confirmation of the tidings that after M wanga had been overthrown in Uganda, his successor, Kiwiwa, was disposed of in like summary fashion, because he executed two Arabs who had driven out the missionaries. The Arabs of the lake region, like those of the coast, see that the time has come for a struggle between their methods-indeed, even their very means of livelihood-and those which the European trade companies are bringing in. Hitherto they have practically controlled the commerce of the interior of Africa and have acquired and held a potent influence over its people. They have terribly misused this power in the slave trade, and now see not only this terrible occupation attacked, but the Germans, the Portuguese, the Eng lish, the French and the Italians FROM PIER 29, EAST RIVER, NEW YORK routes to the interior of the continent. They accept the issue and begin the fight by driving out the missionaries from the interior and declaring war against all the projects of Europeans.


