Fears for the ice crop have been allayed. It is thought that a full supply will be secured.

Gen. Sheridan is to be the orator at the memorial exercises in honor of Gen. Sheridan at Albany in the latter part of next month.

Gen. Longstreet has been added to the list of speakers for the Michigan Republican Club banquet to be held in Detroit presently.

Mr. McDonald, the Lieutenant Governor of Michigan, killed a few days ago in a railroad accident, had an insurance on his life of \$100,000.

The counting of the electoral vote is in progress in Washington City to-day. It is a matter in which we do not feel the slightest interest, this time.

Senator Allison, who has been so widely discussed and speculated about for some time past, is, like Iowa's other United States Senator, an Ohio man.

Mrs. Geo. L. Lorillard is again married, this time to a weazen-faced dried up variety by the name of Agreda and with the title of count. The title, however, covers a multitude of other deficiencies.

Birmingham, Ala. is about to enlarge its corporate limits by taking in the suburbs and several thousand of the suburban population. A bill will be presented to the Legislature of Alabama authorizing this extension. Birmingham has had phenomena growth. Founded only a little more than fifteen years ago, it now has a population of between 30,000 and 40,000, and is growing more rapidly now than at any time during its brief history.

Virginia will elect a governor next November and Col. Charles T. O'Ferrall, of Harrisonburg, now a representative in Congress, and Col. William Lamb, of Norfolk, are being groomed for the race. Both of these gentlemen were gallant Confederates but O'Ferrall stood by his principles and Lamb apostacized. The result in the State at the election last fall was very close—only 1,541 Democratic majority—and the fight next fall will be a warm one.

It is just as we said, Belle Boyd and Belle Starr were two different and distinct people. The New York World made them as one, but now corrects its error. Belle Boyd was in Wilmington during the war, and sailed from this port in one of the blockade runners, but she didn't bring her horse with her (unless it was a clothes horse) nor did she swing him up in her cabin. We were here at the time but failed to witness any of those equestrian displays. If she went abroad as an accredited agent of the government nobody here knew of it.

The correspondence on the Samoan question between the governments of Germany and the United States seems to indicate that Prince Bismarck has been playing with a high, imperious hand indeed, and a hand which is evidently beginning to lose its cunning. The German Chancellor cannot for one moment imagine that America is to be insulted with impunity. Prince Bismarck no doubts thinks that the Yankee will not dare to take his own part, knowing, as he must do, that the German fleet can steam to Sandy Hook in ten days and shell all the towns along the coast from New York to New Orleans; but mayhap it does not enter even into the decaying old man's calculations that the tie of blood which binds these islands to Columbia would never permit a German fleet so to operate. It is just as well to inform him of this fact, but if he doubts it let him instruct his secret agents over here—and there are plenty—to ask a casual hundred of Englishmen the question. He will find at least 90 per cent. would unhesitatingly reply that before the Kron Prinz could rain his iron shower on Broadway the Rainbow and the Inflexible would have first to be beneath the waves of the Atlantic.—St. Stephen's Review, London.

A Real Curiosity.
A singular curiosity was exhibited to-day at Capt. Jas. B. Huggins' store, on Market street. It is a section of an alanthus, or "Paradise" tree, which was cut down yesterday in front of his residence, on Dock street, which has embedded in it a complete iron horse shoe. This shoe was found fully five inches from the outer surface of the tree and near it, also embedded in the wood, was a staple and the snap of a cheek rein. The discovery was made when the man, who was at work on it, struck his axe into the wrought iron horse shoe, making a cut in it a quarter of an inch deep. In all probability the shoe was nailed upon the tree many years ago, as a horse-hitcher, and has since become embedded in the wood by the growth of the tree.

A Bold Burglary.
The residence of Capt. John F. Divine, on Mulberry street, near Fourth, was entered last night by a burglar. The rascal got in by entering the kitchen, which is on the basement, and forcing the door of the kitchen he got into the dining room and from this room ascended to the upper floor. He entered Capt. Divine's room and took his clothing out into the entry, where he rifled the pockets, securing a small amount of money only but taking off a pocket book containing some papers, valuable to no one but to Capt. Divine himself, and which that gentleman is anxious to recover. Fortunately he overlooked Capt. Divine's watch and a roll of bank notes. Another room on the same floor was visited and some more money, a small amount, was obtained. The rascal was interrupted in the job by hearing Mr. Morrison Divine as he entered the house with his night key. He thereupon slipped down the stairs and dashed past Mr. Divine just as he struck a light in the entry, and vanished through the rear door, which he had taken the precaution to leave open before he ascended to the upper floor, so as to facilitate his escape. It was a quick rush but not so quick but that Mr. Divine could see that the man was colored and that he was barefooted. It was then about half-past 12 o'clock. Mr. Divine did not have time to recognize the man and there seems therefore to be no clue to the party.
