The railroads are to farnish sched ules of rates within thirty days after the appointment of the Commission. An appeal may be heard and de termined by consent in chambers before any judge of a district thro' or into which the railroad concerned may extend and the Supreme Court is empowered to advance a cause on its docket to obtain a speedy hear

The Commissioners are to be elected always by the General Assem-

In establishing rates the Commis-sioners are to have regard to the capital invested, the earnings of the railroads, the cost of operating the same and such other considerations as may tend to a wise determination.
