The Railroad Commission bill, as amended and reported, and as it will probably pass both houses, embraces the following provisions:
The railroads are to furnish scheduled rates within thirty days after the appointment of the Commission.
An appeal may be heard and determined by consent in chambers before any judge of a district or into which the railroad concerned may extend and the Supreme Court is empowered to advance a cause on its docket to obtain a speedy hearing.
The Commissioners are to be elected always by the General Assembly.
In establishing rates the Commissioners are to have regard to the capital invested, the earnings of the railroads, the cost of operating the same and such other considerations as may tend to a wise determination.

The Flowering Moss.

The fame of the beautiful flowering moss has gone abroad. It is peculiar to this immediate section and, like the Venus flytrap, we doubt if it can be found anywhere more than 50 miles from this city. They claim to have it in Florida but they are mistaken. There is a plant there which resembles it, but it is a very different thing altogether. The Florida plant grows only in exceedingly light, sandy soil, in and among the wire grass, with pure white blossoms, which wither and fade, even with the roots attached, in fifteen minutes. Ours is far prettier. It is smaller than the Florida plant, more delicate, more compact, with more luxuriant foliage, with pink buds and it will keep fresh and pretty for days. It goes all over the country and a lady in this city is about to express to a lady in Norfolk a large box of it, to be sold at a fair, to be given there next week, for the benefit of a hospital, in which all congregations will unite. Florists have in vain attempted to cultivate it. It will grow nowhere else than in its native woods in this immediate section.

A Few Rich Men.

Col. R. Y. McAden, of Charlotte, recently deceased, left nearly a million behind him. His entire estate is valued at \$900,000, including \$110,000 in life insurance. There is not a man resident in Wilmington worth as much money. There is one, a Wilmingtonian proper, but resident in New York, who is probably worth two million. Some years ago his name was published in a New York paper in a list of four hundred persons who were worth a million or more. We have heard of two estates here worth \$500,000 and there are probably a dozen others worth from \$100,000 to \$500,000.
