IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The House amendments to the Senate bill for a light-house on Diamond Shoals, off Cape Hatteras, North Carolina, were concurred in.

The Army Appropriation bill was taken up and a number of amendments reported from the committee were agreed to; they were chiefly striking out small items of miscellaneous character.

Consideration of the bill had not been concluded, when a message was received from the House announcing the death of Mr. Burnes, of Missouri, on January 24th last. Eulogies upon the deceased member were pronounced.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. C. F. Booker, of Missouri, qualified as the successor of the late James N. Burnes.

Mr. Reed, of Arkansas, submitted the conference report on the bill authorizing the Leavenworth & Rio Grande Railroad Company to construct a road across the Indian Territory. Agreed to.

The Senate amendments were non-concurred in to the Agricultural Appropriation bill.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

(Star Report Condensed.)

RALEIGH, Feb. 24.—In the Senate bills were introduced:

By Mr. Bennett, to protect the lives and limbs of persons engaged in constructing buildings.

By Mr. Reid, to require butchers to register trade marks of cattle.

By Mr. Price, providing for the sale of the Governor's mansion.

Bills passed third reading: To incorporate Roberdell, Anson county; to authorize the City of Raleigh to issue bonds and levy a special tax for improvements; to incorporate the Farmer's State Alliance of North Carolina; to amend the law relative to the practice of medicine in the State.

A message was received from the Governor transmitting the names of Rufus S. Tucker and B. F. Parker as trustees of the institution for the Deaf and Dumb and Blind.

The Finance Committee reported the revenue bill, fixing the rate of taxation at 80 cents.

The Railway Commission bill comes before the Senate to-morrow.

HOUSE.

A bill was passed to protect sheep from dogs by requiring owners of dogs to pay two dollars for each sheep killed and one dollar for each sheep injured: all dogs attempting to kill or injure sheep to be killed.

A bill passed appropriating \$5,000 to purchase a brickyard farm near Raleigh for the penitentiary, provided the title is made good.

The bill appropriating \$5,000 out of the public school fund for a training school for teachers came up as the special order, and after a debate of three hours failed to pass.
