We have received from the United States Signal office the monthly weather chart for March, which is based upon 18 years of observation at this place.

The transittions from hot to cold are frequent and sudden with more decided cool changes between the 3rd and 6th, the 17th and 20th, and 20th and 94th and 26th. The highest temperature was 84 deg. in 1878, and the lowest 27 deg. in 1873. The wind averages 9 miles an hour from the southwest. The highest hourly velocity was 54.14 on the 17th, in 1876.

We have 1 clear day in each 4, 1 cloudy day in 3, and rain 1 day in each 2, with an average rainfall of 14 of an inch.

The greatest daily rainfall was 5.26 inches on 27th, in 1882.

The weather charts which have been issued for 12 months will now cease, as they will also cover the weather for the same months of sub-
