Charlotte has been treated to a big sensation, and a costly one. The jewelry store of Mr. John Farrier, on Tryon street, was broken into on Thursday night and the safe robbed of \$2,500 worth of watches and diamonds. It was evidently the work of experts. The safe was drilled into and blown open. There is absolutely not a trace left of the robbers.

Grover Cleveland, ex-President and next President, is now simply a plain, every day citizen of this mighty republic. He has an office at 45 William street, New York and is generally in his chair, the same he used at the White House, by the way, every day at 9 o'clock. But he can't put his head out of doors without attracting an immense amount of attention. Crowds even follow him when he appears on the street. He is his own master now and doesn't have to shake hands with everybody he comes in contact with.

The New York Herald has interviewed all of the Senators and Congressmen on the subject of the Democratic leadership and it is interesting to note what they say. Mr. Randall seems to be a favorite with many. Senator Vance replied: "It is very difficult to say," and Senator Ransom made the best reply published. He said: "The Democratic party allows no leaders; it leads itself." Maj. McClunmy was divided in his views between Carlisle and Randall; Mr. Simmons thought Carlisle was of course the leader in the House. Mr. Whitney is popular but the South is with David B. Hill on Civil Service; Mr. Johnston thought that Whitney would lead in the next contest; Col. Cowles, with great emphasis, pronounced for Samuel J. Randall; Mr. Latham was non-committal; he "didn't know"; Col. Rowland "didn't know"; Col. Henderson said "Grover Cleveland."

To-Night.

At the Opera House to-night Miss Prescott and Mr. McLean, a double-headed star attraction, will appear in the most beautiful play *Virginus*. These artists have been seen here before in other plays and our people may look for a rare treat. Speaking of the recent appearance of this attraction in Forth Worth, the *Gazette* says:

For so young an actor as McLean to essay so difficult a role as that of *Virginus* among a people with whom the memory of John McCullough is a recent treasure, and the recollection of Edwin Forrest still fresh, requires a great deal of that nerve which comes from a knowledge of the possession of ability; to succeed in giving even a tolerably satisfactory interpretation is a victory; to win the applause of the people and the rich encomiums of the critics is a triumph. It takes the last team to fitly describe the success of Mr. McLean. He gives an interpretation of *Virginus* that is as strong, as tender as anything that has been seen in this generation.

Of Miss Prescott's *Virginus* too much cannot be said in praise. It was graceful, sweet, girlish, womanly. There was an ineffable charm in everything she said and did that made her pleasing always. The character is a difficult one—to draw the line between the too great weakness of the girl and the too great strength of the woman. But Miss Prescott drew it with a hand so steady, a skill so sure as to make the character neither the one nor the other.

To-morrow afternoon a special matinee will be given, when *Ingo-Mar* will be presented. Doors will open at 2 o'clock and the curtain will rise at 3 o'clock. At night the last appearance will be presented—*A Winter's Tale*.

North Carolina Power Co.

The subscribers to the stock of the North Carolina Power Company, a corporation chartered at the recent session of the General Assembly, have organized and elected the following Board of Directors: Geo. W. Williams, Jno Wilder Atkinson, James Sprunt, Isaac Bates, Henry A. Burr, David G. Worth, Wm. Latimer.

At a subsequent meeting of the Directors, Mr. H. A. Burr was elected President, Mr. Wm. L. Smith, Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. E. P. Bailey, General Manager.

This company succeeds the Wilmington Electric Lighting Company, and has already made arrangements to largely increase the present plant.

It will continue the Thomson-Houston system of electric lighting, which has proved so satisfactory and will very soon begin the erection of a fine building for its central station.

Belford's for March.

There is a lot of good matter in *Belford's Magazine* for March, notably a good story, "A Young Girl's Ideal," by Miss Julia Magruder, and "A Couple of Vagabonds," by James W. Steele. Among the soldier papers are "Wealth and Its Consequences," by N. G. Parker, and "The Cost of Things," by "X." "Novelists on Novels" contains short letters in which a number of novelists name their favorite works of fiction. The article is curious and instructive. The editorial departments occupy a great deal of space, and this month, as usual, they are ably filled. Colonel Platt's own special department bristles with suggestive titles and pointed paragraphs. The subjects are "The Sale of the Presidency," "Vacant Pews and Worried Pulpits," "The Infant Mind," and "The Truth About Samoa." In the latter the editor glances rapidly at Germany's various efforts at colonization, wonders at the apathy with which some of the stronger naval powers regard it and frees his mind about Bismarck. The novellette for the month is a fascinating story entitled "A Covenant With Death," by the author of "An Unlaid Ghost." It is published complete. *Belford's* is issued by Bedford, Clarke & Co., New York, at \$2.50 a year.

The Governor will be met at the Front street depot on the arrival of the 6 p. m. train from Weldon on Wednesday evening by the general committee, accompanied by the Wilmington Light Infantry and Germania Band, and escorted to the Orton, where a public reception will be held, beginning at half-past 8 o'clock.

Thursday, at 11 a. m., the Governor and party will be taken on a special train over the Seacoast road to Wrightsville, for the purpose of formally selecting the site for the permanent encampment of the N. C. State Guard, when the deed for the same will be presented by Hon. Chas. M. Stedman.

At noon an oyster roast will be served to the Governor and invited guests, with a lunch later in the day at the Hammocks, and after the return of the party to the city in the evening a banquet will be given in honor of his Excellency at the Orton.

Friday morning a trip down the river to view the government works, to visit the forts and other places of interest, is contemplated.
