The 13th annual session of the Young Men's Christian Association convened in the First Baptist Church in this city at 8 o'clock last night.

There was a preliminary Bible reading at the rooms of the Association, at 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon, conducted by Mr. S. M. Sayford, of Massachusetts, a distinguished lawyer and a member of the organization.

The church last night was filled to its utmost capacity. The young people especially were out in strong force.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Thos. F. Wood and the services were inaugurated by singing No. 135, of the Gospel Hymn. The scriptures were then read by Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, Pastor of St. Paul's E. L. Church.

Mr. W. G. Burkhead, of Raleigh, was then called to the chair and on him devolved the duty of replying to the address of welcome.

Rev. Thomas Hume, D. D., Chairman of the State Executive Committee of the Y. M. C. A., was then introduced. He presented Mr. S. M. Sayford as the speaker of the evening.

We cannot follow Mr. Sayford's address in full. It was a perfect gem and no synopsis could possibly give an idea of its interest, force and beauty.

At the conclusion of Mr. Sayford's address, the chairman announced the following as a Committee on Permanent Organization.

The singing of a couple of Gospel Hymns began the exercises of the day, after which there were Bible readings by Mr. Wm. Black, of Maxton.

The committee on permanent organization then made the following report, which was adopted: President—Prof. W. A. Blair, of Winston.

A discussion was then held as to 'How to get the most good out of the Convention?' which was participated in by several of the delegates.

The Ladies' Memorial Association met yesterday afternoon to make some of the preliminary arrangements for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

Work creating especial interest, as did also the 'Educational features' of the Association. The following resolution was then submitted and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it is the duty of this Convention, unless prevented by providential circumstances, to remain over for the devotional exercises on the Sabbath, and that no member, under any circumstances, travel on the Sabbath at any time and especially on returning from this convention.
