In the New York market scallops
are quoted at \$2 per gallon, shad
roe at 25 cents a pair, sheephead at
18 cents a pound, red snapper at 12
cents a pound, Southern shad at 50
cents to \$1 each and diamond-back
terrapias (very scarce) at \$50 per
dozen.

The first radishes of the season
were in the market this morning.
They were real pretty and sold for
five cents a bunch. They were raised
by Messrs. Hays & Jones, at their
farm near the city. These gentle-
men say that they will have beets in
market very early in April.

Of Interest to Truckers.

Mr. J. R. Kehly, Assistant Gen-
eral Manager of the Atlantic Coast
Line, was in Charleston on Satur-
day for the purpose of making ar-
rangements for the running of the
through vegetable trains to the
North, as we learn from the *News*
and *Courier*. There is to be a meet-
ing there to-morrow of representa-
tives of the Coast Line, the Penn-
sylvania R. R., the Plant system and
various Florida railroads, at which
will be decided all matters in con-
nection with the running of these
trains and a schedule for them. Mr.
Kehly has given the Charleston
shippers assurances that the service
will be put in operation just as soon
as the demand warrants it. This is,
of course, the same train by which
the Wilmington truckers will ship
and as our truckers will be this year
but very little behind those of
Charleston, we think that the ser-
vice will be needed not later than
the 15th of April—with continued
good seasons, of course. It went
into operation last year on the 9th
of April.

State Convention of the Y. M. C. A.—Sun- day's Services.

The services of the Convention of
the Young Men's Christian Associa-
tion yesterday were varied and in-
teresting. In the morning there
were consecration services at 10
o'clock at the First Baptist Church
which were fully attended and were
very interesting. The singing was
good, the Bible reading instructive
and many of the delegates present
reconsecrated their lives to the ser-
vice of the Master. There were no
long speeches. Many of the re-
marks were contained in a single
sentence, thus affording a larger
number an opportunity of speaking,
and some of the heartfelt utterances
aroused profound and tearful emo-
tions.

AFTERNOON SERVICES.

The services at the Opera House,
at 4:30 p. m., were conducted by Mr.
J. R. Mott, assisted by Messrs. J. C.
Diggs, A. W. McLeod, Wm. Black
and G. M. Busey. They were for
young men only, and there was a
large throng in attendance who
might have received much profit
from what was said and we hope
that great good will be the result.
The speakers were all in earnest in
their efforts for the salvation of souls
and the solemn warnings they gave
to young men ought to be heeded.

At Grace M. E. Church there were
services especially for ladies at 4:15
p. m., which were conducted by Mr.
L. A. Coulter, assisted by Messrs.
Southgate, Blair, Stowe and Hanna.

The spacious rooms were crowded
to their utmost capacity, and it was
pleasantly noticeable that but very
few were present from mere idle
curiosity—for the sake of seeing and
being seen—but all seemed impress-
ed with an earnest desire to hear
and be benefited in their spiritual
needs and guided and aided in all
the Christian duties devolving upon
them. It was pleasant to notice the
watchful attention which the sug-
gestions of the different speakers
received and the hearty approval of
the sentiments enunciated which
was everywhere manifest.

The services for boys at the First
Presbyterian Church at 4:15 p. m.
were conducted by E. L. Harris, as-
sisted by Messrs. G. T. Adams, C. W.
Tillett, S. H. Dean, W. C. Dowd and
Rev. R. C. Beaman. There were
175 bright boys in attendance, all
under 16 years of age. The topic
selected was "What the Lord Jesus
is to the Boy", and it was told by
song, readings from the Scriptures
and by illustration. Excellent brief
speeches were made by S. H. Dean,
G. T. Adams and Rev. P. H. Hoge.
An after meeting was held when the
claims of Christ were pressed home
to about 50 boys, 27 of whom were
especially earnestly desirous of en-
tering the "New Life."

NIGHT SERVICES.

The closing exercises of the day
and of the Convention were held at
8 o'clock last night at the First Baptist
Church. The weather was mis-
erably inclement, causing some to
fear that the ladies would be pre-
vented from attending, but they
were there in force, eagerly and
earnestly watching every part of the
proceedings. Rev. Dr. Hume was
the principal speaker, and he de-
livered an able, learned and instruc-
tive address to the edification of all
present.

At the conclusion of his address
Mr. G. C. Worth, being called upon,
stated that there was urgent need
of \$105 more than had already been
raised, for the necessities of those
who proposed to canvass the State
in the interest of Foreign Missions.

On the presentation of the facts a
collection was taken up resulting in
contributions amounting to \$126.68.
The following resolutions were
then submitted and were adopted
unanimously:

Resolved, That our sincere thanks
are due and are hereby gratefully
tendered:

1st. To the good people of Wil-
mington for the cordial and gen-
erous hospitality extended to our
Convention, now assembled in this
city.

2nd. To the pastors of the differ-
ent denominations for so kindly and
freely offering us the use of their
churches in which to hold our differ-
ent services, and for the valuable
assistance and encouragement they
have given us by attending our
meetings and engaging in our ex-
ercises.

3rd. To the Ladies' Auxiliary for
the tender sympathy they have
manifested in our efforts and our
duties, and also, for the bountiful
and gracious receptions given us

while attending this Convention.

4th. To the different members who
have so carefully and thoroughly
instructed, while, at the same time,
interested, us in the different modes
of carrying on and perfecting the
great work in which we are en-
gaged; and to Mr. G. M. Busey, Gen-
eral Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of
Wilmington, for the very efficient
aid rendered the Convention, as well
as the individual members who com-
pose this body.

5th. To Mr. W. A. Blair for the
patient, faithful and business-like
manner in which he has so courte-
ously, but rapidly, discharged his
duties as President of the Conven-
tion, and to Messrs. J. F. Jones, J.
B. Whitaker, Jr., and F. A. Harris,
the secretaries of the Convention,
who have so accurately reported our
proceedings and so earnestly per-
formed their arduous duties.

6th. To the various railroad com-
panies for the reduction of rates
given us, with the hope that next
time they may even help us more, so
that greater numbers may be able
to attend from afar; also, to the
newspapers of Wilmington that
have encouraged our work and so
faithfully reported our proceedings.

7th. To the Local Committee for
their untiring efforts in trying to
add to our comfort and to our plea-
sure while guests in the city.

8th. That we have noted with the
deepest pleasure the regularity of
the attendance and the earnestness
of the members during the sittings
of the Convention; their thorough
consecration to their work and their
zeal in our Master's cause, and we
do prayerfully appeal to all present,
that they return to their homes
more fully aroused to the dignity
and importance of our work, and
that they, following in the footsteps
of our beloved Saviour, may, like
him, go forth to do much good, re-
membering that he who shall save
a soul from death shall cover a multi-
tude of sins.

9th. That a copy of these resolu-
tions be sent to all the newspapers
of Wilmington with a request that
they be published.

adjourned.
