Col. B. R. Moore, Col. E. S. Latimer, Mr. James H. Chadbourne, Jr., and Mr. G. Herbert Smith will start to-morrow up the coast, on an inland water trip, for the purpose of "spying out the land." These gentlemen go in the interest of the Wrightsville & Onslow Navigation Company, of which Col. Moore is the projector. They mean business and if they can demonstrate the entire feasibility of the proposed enterprise, which we have no doubt they will do, they will at once set it afloat. The plan is to run light draught steamers between the Hummocks and points on New River and in the upper part of Onslow county.

Personal.
Mr. George Harris, Jr., of Philadelphia, is in the city to-day on a short visit to relatives and friends here.

Mr. L. Whiting left here this morning for Durham, where he goes to take charge of Mr. A. F. Lucas' bottling establishment in that city.

Col. W. P. Canaday has resigned the Presidency of the Carolina Oil and Creosote Company on account of the pressure of other duties, and Mr. A. A. Thomas, a capitalist and banker of Washington, D. C., has been elected President of the Company.

Maj. Roger P. Atkinson, Chief Engineer of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R., is in the city to-day, on a tour of inspection of the work which is being done for the road in this locality.

Mr. J. D. Woody, who has been in Norfolk in charge of the house there, has returned to the city and will remain here during the Summer.

Mrs. H. B. Jewett has returned from her visit to the Northern markets.

Rev. W. S. Creasy left last evening for the Western part of the State for the purpose of accompanying his parents, who have been visiting him for a number of months, to their home at Mt. Airy, N. C., and of delivering an address to the Knights of Pythias at Greensboro.

"Gales' North Carolina Almanack."
Mr. Alex. H. Merritt, of Wayeross, Sampson county, called into see us to-day and exhibited to us a copy of a venerable and valuable relic of the past, "Gales' North Carolina Almanack, for the year of our Lord 1821." We have examined it with much interest. It was printed by J. Gales, Raleigh, and the calculations were made by John Beasley, astronomer. That was the 45th year of America Independence. The names of the "Members of Assembly for 1820" are given. New Hanover was represented by George Fennell in the Senate and John Walker and Abel Morgan in the House and Wilmington by John D. Jones. The Senator was, we think, the late Rev. George Fennell, uncle of Mr. Owen Fennell, of this city, and the Commener the late Maj. John Walker, father of Mr. J. Alvers Walker and Mrs. W. H. C. Whiting. The times of holding the various courts is given. The U. S. Circuit Court was held in Raleigh twice each year, by Chief Justice Marshall and Judge Potter. The Clerk of the District Court held here was C. Walker. John Branch was Governor, William Hill, Secretary of State, John Haywood, Treasurer, and Samuel Goodwin Comptroller. James Monroe was at the time President of the United States, Daniel D. Tompkins, Vice President, John Quincy Adams, Secretary of State, and John C. Calhoun, Secretary of War. There are several coincidences between that year and this which it is interesting to note. The days of the week, according to dates, ran very nearly with those of this week. For instance, March 26th, in 1821, was on Monday and this year it is on Tuesday, and Easter Sunday, which fell on April 23d in 1821 falls this year one day earlier, on April 21st.

The Board of Directors of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad Company have authorized the payment of three and a half per cent. interest on certificates of indebtedness of the Company; payable at the Treasurer's office in this city on and after the 1st of April.

The report of the Railroad Commissioners of South Carolina shows that the earnings of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad for January, 1889, are \$12,881.68 more than for January, 1888, and of the Northeastern Railroad \$11,232.76 more than for the same month last year.

Exports Foreign.
Nor barque *Amazon*, Eliasen, cleared to day for London, with 3,444 barrels rosin, valued at \$3,844.09, shipped by Messrs. Williams & Murchison; Ger barque *C. L. Weyer*, French, cleared for Stettin, with 3,505 barrels rosin, valued at \$3,900, shipped by Messrs. E. Peschau & Westermann, and Ger barque *Dennetra*, Schramm, cleared for Stettin, with 3,785 barrels rosin, valued at \$4,183, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co.

Time Alone Will Show.
Some few of the delegates to the Convention of the Y. M. C. A. still remain with us—they say they cannot tear themselves away—but they are not many. In every way was the convention a grand success, socially as well as religiously. The delegates were a handsome body of men—the handsomest, we think, we have ever seen assembled together—and as they are impressionable, as all young men are, and made many pleasant acquaintances here, we think that some of them will need the benefit of the sea air before the Summer is far advanced and that they will come here to seek it. What the ultimate result may be time alone will show.
